Arctic Crash Survivor is Lawyer

B-17 Navigator's Feet Frozen After Plane Hits Greenland Peak.

It was during the first year of the United States' participation in World War II that a B-17 bomber, badly needed in England to help repatriate for the terrific fighting Germany was doing, crashed into one of Greenland's treacherous glacier peaks.

Navigator William F. O'Hara, Scranton, Pa., extracted himself from the wreckage with nothing more serious than a few bruises and snow in his boots. The latter, however, resulted in two frozen feet and, later, double amputation.

Search planes (drawing No. 2) braved the elements to make periodic parachute drops of life-sustaining food, but all efforts to effect a rescue failed, some with fatal results.

Four months after the crash a lumbering search plane, skis replacing the customary wheels, set down near the group. Captain O'Hara was carried aboard (drawing No. 3). Twice crew members had to rock the plane to break the frozen skis loose. But the officer soon was on his way to a hospital. The frozen feet were removed. Many months of hospitalization followed. Artificial legs were fitted, and he learned to walk again.

Captain O'Hara received his release from duty and decided to enter Georgetown University Law School, Washington, D. C. He graduated recently near the top of his class. In the lower photograph he is shown in as a member of the District of Columbia bar by Chief Justice Bolitha J. Laws. Mr. O'Hara, 27, is now working with the Veterans Administration in Washington as an adjudication officer, but plans eventually to open his own law office. He is married and has two children.
