200 ATTEND VANPORT CENTER

Vanport, July 16.—Analysis of data provided in registration papers of the 220 students attending Vanport Center College shows that 94 per cent of the students are veterans with an average length of service of 34 months.

Dr. Stephen E. Epler, director of the extension college, believes that Vanport has a higher percentage of veterans in the student body than other institutions in the country.

Thirty-one of the Vanport veterans are disabled. Eight of the

July is usually a critical month in the garden when some late-season vegetables are still to be set out or planted, when weeds have a habit of gaining ground, and when a good job of irrigating may mean a good crop instead of a poor one.

Parker says some of the crops that may be put in following peas and other early vegetables are celery, cauliflower, late cabbage, Brussels sprouts, kale, late turnips and rutabagas.

Good irrigation involves giving vegetables more water than ordinary crops require, but avoiding overwatering. Quick-growing leafy vegetables and those with shallow roots require water more often than others. Vegetables with light-green leaves turn darker green when in need of water. If the soil is too wet and waterlogged, the leaves turn lighter green or even yellow.

Usually water can be applied most economically by running it along the rows in shallow furrows. If the ground is uneven and the garden is not too large, the canvas type of soakers apply the water with little waste.

Sprinkling with a hose held in the hand is useful chiefly to help germinate shallow-planted seeds. Where real irrigation is needed, hand sprinkling may do more harm than good by fooling the gardener into thinking he has helped the plants when he has merely formed a dry crust through which deeper moisture will be lost.

Bumper Harvest Is in Prospect

WASHINGTON.—This country is well on the way today toward its sixth consecutive bumper harvest.

In fact, the Agriculture Department in its latest monthly crop report said the current outlook for total farm production has seldom been surpassed.

The report issued July 10th said conditions prevailing July 1 indicated a record corn crop, near-record crops of wheat, oats, potatoes and rice, and large crops of vegetables and most fruits.

The outlook on grains was particularly gratifying to food officials, because supplies have been largely depleted in meeting foreign relief demands and in feeding a near-record livestock population.

If the grain crops turn out as now indicated, the nation will be in a position to carry out its commitment to send 250,000 bushels of wheat to shortage areas during the next 12 months and still maintain production of livestock products—meats, milk, eggs and poultry—at levels near those of the past year.

The fact that there will be need for all that can be produced was emphasized anew by Chairman C. Davis of President Truman's Food Emergency Committee.

In a statement issued today, Davis said the United States will meet its goal for general exports from the 1945 crop. But he emphasized that there should be no feeling that the world food crisis is over. He said exports must continue on a large scale at least through September to hold the famine-prevention gains already made.

Two Coos Bay Boys Held on Robbery Charge Tuesday

Two Coos Bay youths, one a juvenile, were held in Reedsport Tuesday following their arrest in connection with a dance hall robbery at Currier's Village and the punching of a safe at the Wardrobe Cleaners in North Bend.

Night Officer D. C. Chappie arrested the pair after he spotted a car, somewhat answering the description given by Coos Bay police, unoccupied and parked in front of the Reedsport Grill.

The officer entered the cafe and placed the pair under arrest. Upon searching the older youth, the officer found a .38 calibre revolver. The younger boy was unarmed.

As the officer started to the jail with his prisoners, they tried to separate, one starting for the car and the other attempting to block the policeman, who quickly frustrated their attempt and handcuffed them both.

Chappie, on his first night of duty with the Reedsport police, said the youths' car contained loot from both robberies.

Hogs Hit a Top Price Yesterday on Chicago Market

Traders chalked up a modern price record for hogs at Chicago's Union Stockyards in early dealing yesterday. A top was established at \$21.50, but most offerings were being held for still higher cash return. The all-time high for hogs is \$23.60 paid in 1919.

Cattle and sheep were steady at yesterday's new price height.

July Is Critical Month for Garden

During the war years, the produce of our victory gardens totaled over 8 million tons of food annually, and during this period our housewives preserved annually between 3 and 4 billion quarts of fruits and vegetables, according to W. B. Parker, assistant county agent.

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Darkened Fruits

A way to prevent the darkening of canned and frozen fruits is by adding ascorbic acid, the pure form of vitamin C, which improves the quality as well as the color. The ascorbic acid powder is particularly valuable for peaches and pears. Other frozen fruits, such as cherries, apricots and apples also show color and quality improvement when ascorbic acid is added before they are frozen.

weeks is much better than several light irrigations at frequent intervals. A light cultivation as soon as the soil is dry enough to work well is nearly as essential as the irrigation, though this needs to be shallow so as not to disturb roots.

For unirrigated gardens or where a sprinkler system is used, mulching will help conserve moisture. Almost any kind of material such as straw, lawn clippings, or leaves may be used. All these will help the soil later when worked, adding needed organic matter.

SCIENTISTS EN ROUTE TO ALASKA TO CHART WAR ON MOSQUITOES

SEATTLE.—Those fabled Alaskan mosquitoes, who started all those wartime gags about being refused in lieu of B-17s, and especially the choosy ones who turned over the GI's dogtag to determine his blood type first, had better look out.

The Department of Agriculture is going after 'em.

Charles Wilson and A. W. Lindquist of Washington, D. C., stopped over here today en route to Alaska to map a war against the pests. They had been connected with the successful insect control program of the Army during the war, and the oft-bitten Army called their attention to the Alaska variety's worst retarding factors.

The present program was made possible by a congressional appropriation and will be the first scientific approach to control those hairy-chested northern man-eaters.

Shallow Wells

Shallow wells must be carefully protected, with good drainage, to prevent contamination by surface water.

Keeping Bananas

Keep bananas at room temperature — about 70 degrees — never in the refrigerator or other cold place.

Killing Ants

Ants can be controlled in yards or gardens by deep cultivation several times in fall, winter and spring to break up the ant colonies and to partially destroy them. For those that remain, mix one ounce of Paris green with one pound of brown sugar and scatter at the rate of one pound to 10,000 square feet. Colonies still remaining can be killed by putting small amounts of carbondisulphide in the openings and then closing the entrance to the nests.

Ancient Sites

The site of ancient Beth-Yerah, on the southern shore of the Sea of Galilee, yielded ruins of buildings of pre-Christian periods. One house had a paved inner court surrounded by living rooms, kitchen, and store rooms. A pre-Bronze-age settlement, with flint axes, was discovered near half; and in a burial ground in this area were found jewelry and other objects of gold, ivory, glass and earthenware.
