AD LIBITUM PICNIC

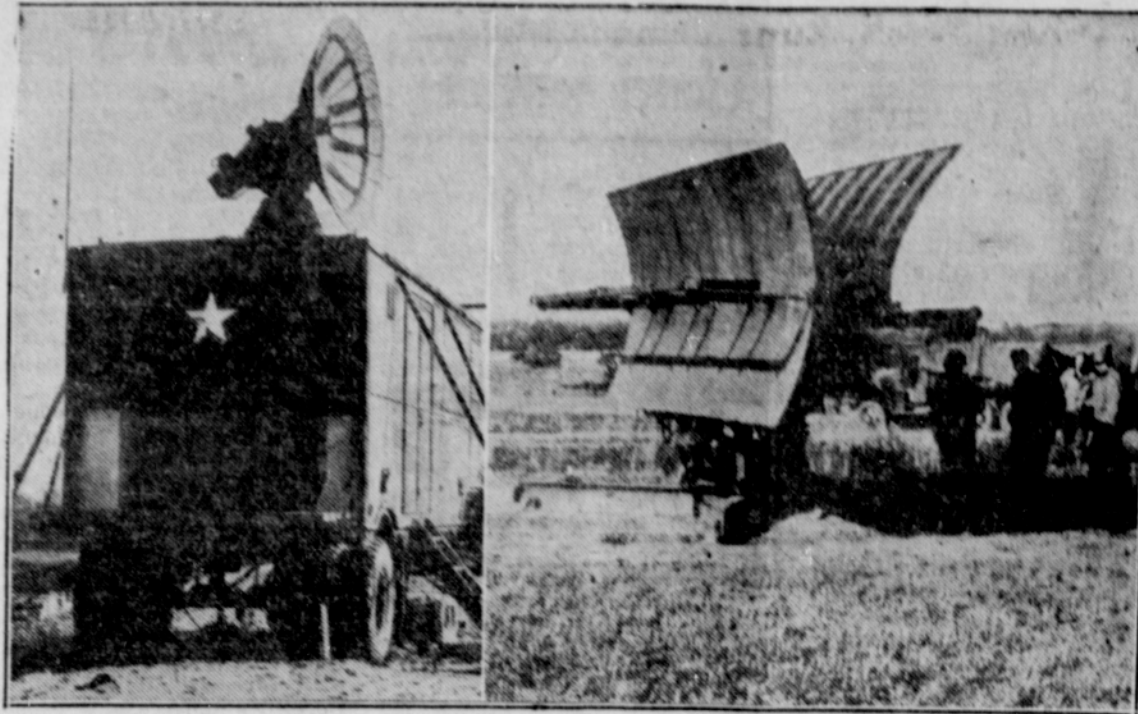

LATE MODELS IN RADAR EQUIPMENT—Left, a modified SCR 584 anti-aircraft radar set and an automatic plotting board. This set is capable of automatically tracking and plotting a flight of aircraft in a precise manner. Fighter and medium bomber aircraft without airborne radar equipment can be tracked and controlled to the target and given the bomb release point during inclement weather. Right, is the "snowplow" radar antenna installed by a Ninth Air Force unit in France. Complete equipment weighs 68 tons, but it does not require special handling because the heaviest component weighs only 600 pounds.

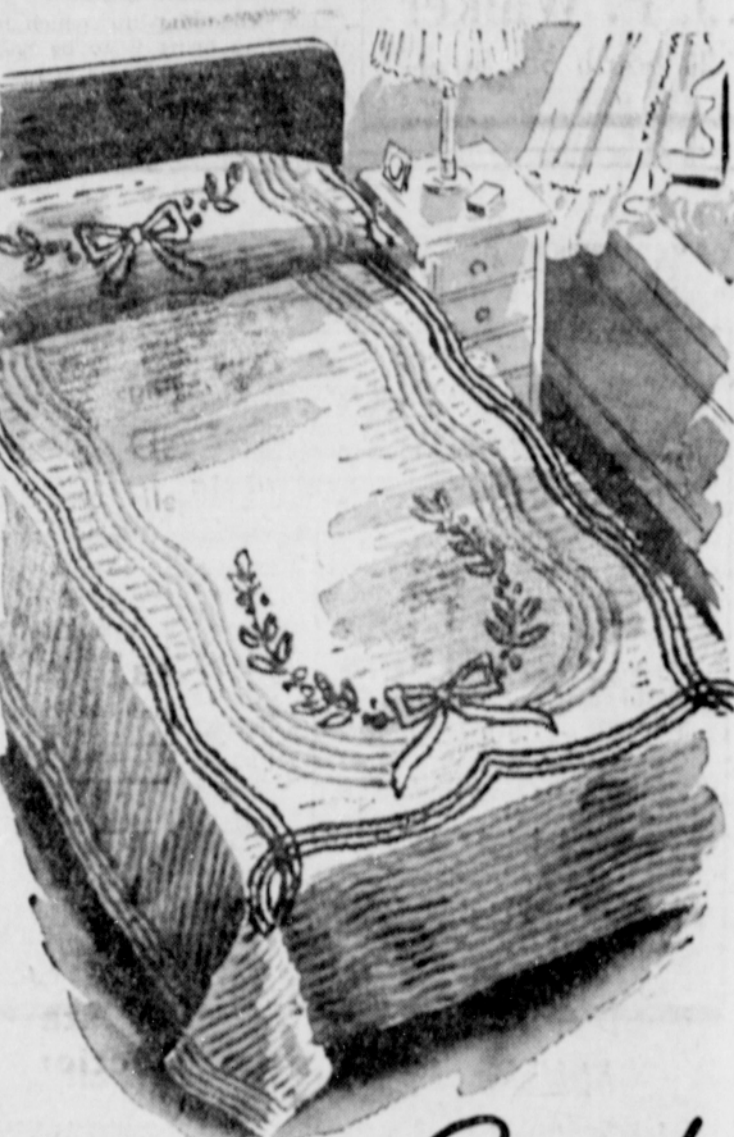
