Remove a Hazard a Day to Live the Safe Way

"Remove a hazard a day to live the safe way" is one of the slogans for National Farm Safety week, July 21 to 27, which will be observed in Lane county and other parts of Oregon, announces O. S. Fletcher, county agent. By press, radio, placards, car stickers and other means arrangements have been made to call attention to the need for constant care to overcome the many hazards of farming.

Accident rates on the farms as well as elsewhere are on the increase since the end of the war, according to word received from Dean Wm. A. Schoenfeld, Oregon State College, appointed chairman of the Oregon farm safety week committee by Governor Snell. The Oregon Industrial Accident commission has noted this increase but does not know the reason.

"Statistics such as 16,000 farm resident accidental deaths in 1945, or 44 farm people dead by accidents each day of the year, may shock us but they do no good unless they result in actual removal of hazards," said Dean Schoenfeld in asking cooperation in the yearly emphasis on safety.

"As President Truman said in proclaiming the special week this year, experience, in previous observances of National Farm Safety week have indicated real benefits from this nationwide emphasis on safety practices."

While every family and every individual on the farm has personal reasons to take safety precautions, the country and even the world have special reasons to be concerned with farm safety this year, adds County Agent Fletcher. Every accident on a farm this year threatens production to that extent at a time when every pound of food is needed badly in some place in the world.

Strange as it may seem, farming is considered one of the most hazardous of occupations, largely because it is so varied and inclusive. Farm machinery, buildings, fires, animals, electricity, tools and the farm home all present hazards that can and do cause injury and death unless constant care is taken.
