We turned off the coast highway at Drayhurst further on to go up 10 Mile Hill to the top of the Coast Range, about one mile high. Cottage Cheese With Fresh Fruit

Crisp salads of flavorful cottage cheese not only give added taste appeal to the luncheon or dinner, but furnish real basic food value as well. An increase in consumption of cottage cheese in recent years indicates that the public has discovered that this dairy food adds much sparkle to the otherwise ordinary meal.

Fresh creamy cottage cheese has a delicious flavor all its own that blends well with any fruit or vegetable. It is highly nutritious for it contains most of the food value of the milk from which it is made. Its protein is of a quality particularly suited to the best growth of children. Its mineral elements, calcium and phosphorus, for the building of bones and teeth are especially valuable. One half cupful of cottage cheese supplies as much high quality protein as one serving of meat, so don't overlook it.

Here is a fresh fruit and cottage cheese salad that is tops in good eating and will provide a good quantity of the protein which is needed in each day's meals.

Cottage Cheese with Fresh Fruit Salad

- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans or other nuts
- Salad greens
- 1 melon, cut in round slices
- 2 oranges
- 2 bananas
- 1 pint fresh sweet cherries or berries
- 3 pineapple slices (if available)

Add salt and lemon juice to cottage cheese. Fold in part of the chopped nuts. Turn into a bowl that has been rinsed in cold water and place in refrigerator to chill. Just before serving unmold on a large salad plate; surround with crisp salad greens and melon rounds, orange sections, banana slices which have been soaked in lemon or pineapple juice, pineapple sections and cherries or berries. Sprinkle remaining nuts over the top of the cottage cheese. Serves 6.
