New Ore. Driving Manual Is Issued

An entirely new edition of the Oregon Driver's Manual has just been released by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr. In more fully illustrated format, the manual is intended primarily to give new drivers the rules of the road. Like earlier editions, it will be issued to all those who desire to be examined for driver's licenses in Oregon. Farrell is urging all highway users to study it, however.

"It is hoped that the material will serve a far broader purpose by encouraging among drivers and pedestrians alike a desire and an ability to assist in the promotion of greater safety for all on the streets and highways of Oregon," Farrell said.

Designed not to be memorized but to be understood, the manual is far more readable than any previous edition. It features large type, prominent headings, and actual photographs in place of most sketches. Highway signs are illustrated in color. The material is presented in extremely brief sections and everyday language.

Included for the first time is a check-list of driving faults similar to the one used by examiners giving driver's license tests.

Another feature is a sample test on Oregon traffic laws. Anyone who studies the manual thoroughly should be able to pass with a perfect or near-perfect grade.

Farrell emphasized that it is not an actual copy of the law. "Technical explanations and exact legal wordings have been omitted intentionally for the purpose of making the subject matter readily understandable," Farrell said.

Women's Legion Is Formed Recently

This organization is composed of all female veterans of both world war I and II from Eugene and the outlying districts. VETS SHOULD NOTIFY VA IF TRANSFERRED

Veterans who are taking on-the-job training were advised today by the Veterans Administration not to quit their jobs or transfer to other employment without notifying the VA first.

Emmett F. McGraw, chief, guidance center in Eugene, explained that failure to do so may jeopardize a veteran's chance to resume training at a later date.

"It is his positive advantage to consult with a VA training officer before quitting his training or taking another job," McGraw stated. "The VA will help the veteran set up a new program of education or job training, or will arrange to postpone his use of the G. I. training rights until a later date."

Life Insurance Service for Vets Moved to Seattle

Decentralization of national service life insurance from New York to the 13 branch offices of the Veterans Administration extended to the northwest as VA branch No. II in Seattle announced receipt of some 500,000 NSLI records of World War II veterans living in the four northwest states and Alaska, Frank Sias, VA contact representative in this area said.

"All matters pertaining to NSLI policies of veterans in Oregon, Idaho, Alaska, Montana and Washington will now be conducted from the northwest branch office of the VA in Seattle," Sias stated. "Veterans can now expect present delays on insurance matters to be partially or completely eliminated within the next three months."

Although veterans are urged to pay premiums by mail directly to the VA branch office in the Exchange Building in Seattle, cash payments can be made at the VA regional office in Portland at 1019 S. W. 10th Avenue.

PLYWOOD CORPORATION SELLS SUTHERLIN PLANT

Springfield Plywood Corporation, which has owned and operated a sawmill and logging operation in Sutherlin for the past two years, has sold the mill to Rock Island Lumber Company of Idaho, the sale effective August 1.

In addition to employees now engaged, a number of workmen of the Rock Island Lumber Company will find employment at Sutherlin. The sawmill was originally built by S. A. Schieman, and later was owned by Shaw Wiseman Lumber Company and L. H. Schetky.

SLAUGHTER OF POULTRY REFUTES DODD'S CLAIM

Oregon poultry growers killed approximately one million chickens because of the recent feed shortage, State Agriculture Director Peterson said Friday in challenging a statement made in Washington by N. E. Dodd, assistant secretary of the Department of Agriculture.

Dodd was quoted as saying the poultry feed situation was much improved in Oregon and Washington and the threatened liquidation of flocks had not materialized.

DRAIN LUMBER MILL SOLD

The Douglas Timber Corp. has bought the Lewis-Baldrige Lumber Co. sawmill at Drain, it was learned Thursday. The corporation was formed in March to acquire the Catching and Randall sawmill, and purchase of the second operation gives the company two mills, each with a daily production of about 40,000 board feet.

F. S. Canton, corporation president, has moved to Drain from Minneapolis, Minn., to operate the mills.

A new fast planer with sufficient capacity to surface lumber from both mills, is being installed, and a resaw will be set up soon in order to increase capacity of the mills and produce more lumber in sizes needed for housing construction, according to the announcement.
