Food Saving to Be Needed Long Teutch Reports

While Oregon and the nation as a whole have met the immediate short-time goals of famine relief, the world food crisis is far from over and will require the continued efforts of this and other surplus producing countries through this year and most of next, says W. L. Teutch, assistant director of extension at O. S. C., after reviewing the activities of famine relief forces in this state and latest reports from the national capital.

Early in the famine campaign the Extension service joined forces with other USDA agencies mobilized by the PMA and carried on an educational campaign among rural families throughout the state. In many counties local committees were active and in others local informational material was distributed through cooperation of the press and radio and at numerous meetings, reports to Teutch indicate.

"President Truman has declared officially that every American can take pride in the record of accomplishment in shipping food for relief," Teutch points out. "Only by cooperation and determined effort has it been possible to make good on our promises, the president stated, in asking for continued cooperation in the months to come to relieve the hunger that still exists in the world."

Individual rural families can do most from here on through continued conservation of bread and wheat products and through saving of fats and oils, Teutch added. Saving of waste fats is still a prime necessity both from the standpoint of general food conservation and to insure a steady supply of manufacturing fats for soap and related products for American use.

The need for home food preservation by canning, freezing and storing is just as important now as during the war years, he emphasized. While it is regrettable that homemakers in this state are unable to obtain the sugar they could use with Oregon's abundant fruit crops, many foods are preserved without sugar which will be needed to replace commercially preserved products required by those who are unable to store locally produced food.

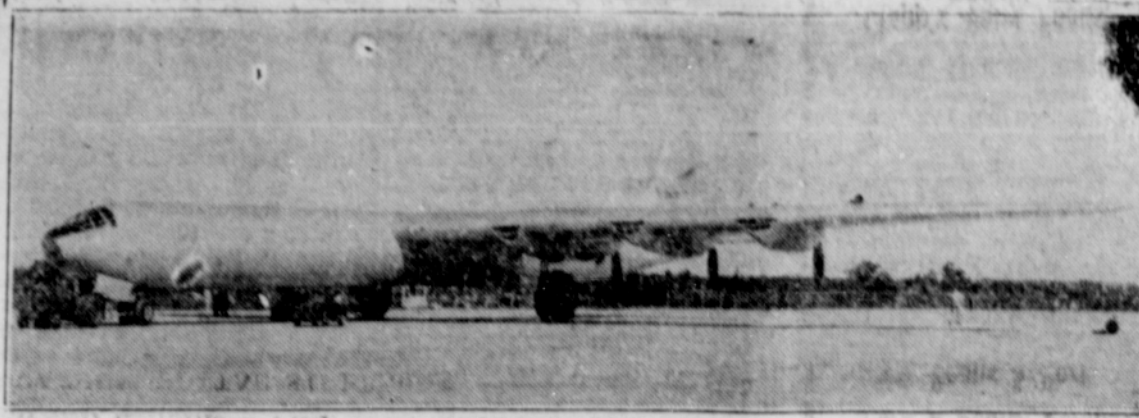

Ore Unemployment Decreases 47 Pct.

With seasonal work picking up all over the state and with nearly 21,000 workers exhausting their 1946 benefits, Oregon's payments to unemployed civilians decreased 44.7 per cent in July to reach a new monthly low of \$831,104 since last November.

In the same period readjustment allowances to veterans dropped 23.3 per cent to \$592,141 for the lowest monthly total this year, while payments to the self-employed also declined for the first time since last fall. Checks for \$226,259 went to 2,301 former servicemen and women just entering business or farming for themselves.

July's benefits to civilians brought the 1946 total to \$14,080,925, more than double any other complete year. Veterans' readjustment allowances reached \$6,159,653 for the year, while self-employment payments totalled \$1,125,817.

Largely because most of those exhausting their benefit rights were in the metropolitan area, Portland's share of the state's payments declined for the first time since last fall. Last month claimants in the Portland office territory drew \$488,518 or 77.2 per cent of all paid in the state, while in June the metropolitan unemployed received \$899,978 or 78.5 per cent of the total.

Out-of-state claimants drew \$197,894 in benefits or 23.8 per cent of all as compared with 23.6 per cent in June. The 2,600 former Oregon workers who received payments in other states last week had been unemployed for an average of 12.3 weeks this year, about a week longer than the average Oregon claimant.

Eastern Oregon offices showed the greatest declines last month, Prineville leading with 57.8 per cent. Others dropping more than 50 per cent included Ontario, La Grande, Dallas, Tillamook, Salem, Lebanon and Albany in order.

World Food Crops Improved But All in Sight Needed

World food crop prospects continue to be reported more favorable than last year, according to a review of current farm market, price and outlook information by L. R. Breithaupt, O. S. C. extension economist. The world wheat crop is expected to be considerably larger and may equal the prewar average. Reduced carryover stocks however may leave the total 1946-47 available supply no greater than in 1945-46.

Total food production in continental Europe may be 10 per cent greater than in 1945, yet around 10 per cent below the prewar level. This means a need for further imports, as even before the war the continent imported about 10 per cent of its food. More food will be available from southern hemisphere countries.

Despite the record-breaking U. S. wheat crop estimated July 15 at one billion 132 million bushels,

the reduced carryover may put the total United States wheat supply for domestic use and exports in 1946-47 around 150 million bushels smaller than this season. America has earmarked 250 million bushels of wheat for overseas shipment in 1946-47. That is 150 million bushels below 1945-46 shipments but much above exports in any other recent year.

The world rice crop, so important in the Far East, is also expected to be larger than last year although still considerably short of prewar production. Conditions in southern China and some other far eastern areas have been unfavorable for planting rice and other crops.
