DEVELOPING WILDLIFE

The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club has a splendid opportunity to establish leadership in aiding the building of recreational facilities around our streams and lakes and in seeing that these lakes are stocked with a specie of fish naturally adapted to the region. The public naturally looks to this organization for guidance in such matters and we hope that the public won't be disappointed because that opportunity is here now.

A second survey is being made of the Cottage Grove lake to determine what type of fish is best suited for that body of water and discover the best means of ridding the lake of its rough fish. The present survey as we understand it, is identical with a similar survey made some two or three years ago and it looks as though there is an urgent need for better cooperation between the state and federal government in matters of this sort for the public good.

We are not experts in matters of fish life and it does seem to us that as many streams as we have and as much lake water that we will shortly have that we ought to have lots of fun fishing and not come home empty handed either. What we would like to see is that the recommendation of the experts be accepted

in regard to the type of fish recommended for the two lakes near us, which is something members of our rod and gun club have not been able to agree on to date.

What we are trying to put over is that the average individual isn't interested in technicalities nor arguments as to the best fish to catch or eat. When he goes fishing he likes to catch a few fish and he can do this if the lake or stream he fishes in is stocked with fish best adapted to its waters.

The fish commission will listen to the Rod and Gun club and its recommendations. This organization has a chance to prove its worth to the community by following a common sense course. And this calls for 100 per cent agreement and 100 per cent cooperation.

JUSTICE TO ALL

There are alarming similarities between the current deliberations over peace treaties and the Versailles agreements which followed World War I—and did so much to sow the seeds of World War II.

Again the great powers are fighting for spheres of influence. Again, the dark shadow of "balance of power" politics hangs over the meetings. Again, the work of the delegates is hampered by secret commitments made during the war. This has been an especially difficult problem for Mr. Byrnes. And again, many of the smaller powers are living in fear of being sold out by the Big Four. The vehement protests registered by Dr. Evatt of Australia are an indication of this.

What seems to have been largely lost is that conception of "One World" which was so brilliantly argued by Wendell Willkie and which, in all its essentials, was once supposed to be the guiding policy of all the Allies. It was a conception based solidly and practically upon the conditions of the times. Today, space is of small importance to a nation's security—a bombing plane can fly anywhere in the world in a matter of hours, and a stratosphere missile can do it in minutes. A fragile peace, based upon force and fear, will be only a breathing space between the last war and the next.

The tremendous problem before the world is to establish a peace which will be fair to all nations, which will respect the rights of all nations, and which will make it possible for all nations to live together in the world without need of resort to arms. That kind of peace cannot come from deals between the great powers which use the small powers as trading material. It can only be built upon the sound foundation of justice to all.

With an overall average of 94, Ray L. Cox, F1/C, of basic engineering led the field of service school honor men for this week, according to the Great Lakes Bulletin, published at the U. S. He is the son of Mrs. Vivian Cox, 503 Third St., and was born at Jarbidge, Nevada.

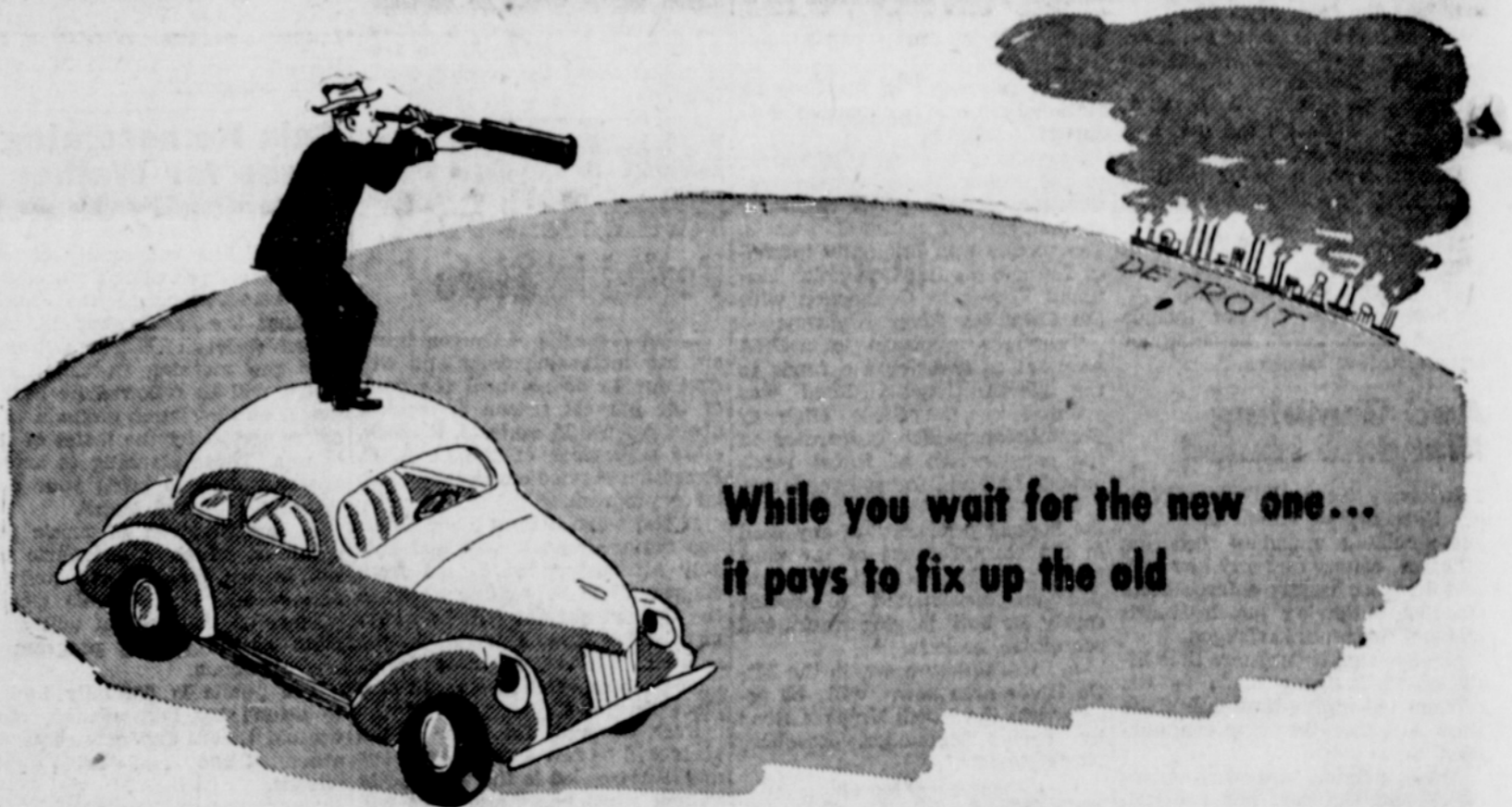
