EMPLOYMENT PASSES FAMED 60 MILLION GOAL

WASHINGTON.—The census bureau said today that employment passed the celebrated 60,000,000 jobs figure during July, counting in the armed forces.

July attainment of a record high of 58,130,000 in civilian employment—almost 4,000,000 above a year ago—was reported. The armed forces had another 2,640,000 on their payrolls.

Increasing difficulty for job hunters was indicated in figures showing that one out of every five job seekers had been looking in vain as long as four months. A year ago, only one in twelve was in that position.

Ore. Police Officer Training Schools

The first post-war state-wide training schools for law enforcement officers will be held at the University of Oregon in Eugene from September 9 to 14 and at the Eastern Oregon College of Education in La Grande from September 16 to 21. The course of instruction will be identical at both schools. The school at Eugene will serve law enforcement officers in western and southern Oregon and the one at La Grande will be conducted for officers in eastern Oregon.

Those training schools are sponsored by the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriff's Association with the cooperation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; Division of Vocational Education; State Department of Education; League of Oregon Cities; Bureau of Municipal Research and Service; University of Oregon; and the Pacific Coast International Association of Law Enforcement Officials. Howard I. Bobbitt, FBI agent in charge of the Portland office, will serve as coordinator at the schools.

The schools are designed to provide basic training for new police officers and refresher training for experienced officers. They have been scheduled because of the demand of law enforcement agencies for training of new officers and also to consider police problems of the post-war period. The course of instruction will include such subjects as: Relations between Police and Public; Laws of Arrest, Search and Seizure, Evidence, Identification, State Law Enforcement Agencies, Technique and Mechanics of Arrest, Juvenile Delinquency, Police Patrol Development, Federal Agencies, Scientific Aids in Crime Detection, Report Writing and Records, Interviews and Interrogation, Note Taking, Descriptions, Court Room Demeanor, and Crime Scene Searches.
