WHY THE CAR SHORTAGE

Readers of this newspaper no doubt are familiar with the railroad car shortage and what it is doing to the lumber industry. The association of American railroads and the National Association of Shippers' Advisory Boards attempts to explain the cause of the present car shortage and give a remedy for alleviating it. In 1941 when the car shortage first developed, each car was loaded every 12.2 days, some times referred to as the turnaround time or the time it takes to load a car, send it out and get it back. Last July the turnaround time was 12.7 days, or a half day more was consumed in loading the cars.

OUR GREATEST WEAKNESS

The number one problem we think is public indifference; indifference to the way the family is brought up, indifference to the manner in which our government is being operated and indifference to the welfare of our fellow man around us.

Possibly not a handful of voters living within Cottage Grove realized that we came near not having any candidates for city offices. We have heard several express the opinion that even as a civic duty the risk was too great and that a councilman and even a police officer for that matter never heard anything but knocks and naturally when a person is devoting several hours a month or several hours a week if necessary to civic problems and getting the pitiful sum of \$1.00 per month as the councilman does, a little knocking goes a long way. It's a funny thing in the human make up that a person can work hard at most any public office. If he or she does an extra good job, most of us take it as a matter of course, but if something comes up that affects us adversely, then we are ready to beef long and loud.

Believe it or not, a number of local people have put in some long hours planning to make this a better place to live, a better trading center. This planning has not born fruit yet, but will in years to come with the proper public cooperation. Communities the same as individuals ought to have plans to operate on to prosper and to provide for us a home and the proper surroundings. Certainly there is nothing to lose in planning. Or should we provide in the past fifty years, alleys, sewers, and utilities such as are found in most other cities where people seem to be doing well and prospering. At any rate a belated effort is being made now to work these things out to provide for those who want to come and live with us.

And speaking of indifference, there isn't any doubt but that selfishness is the greatest contributing factor to indifference in obligations to society and to the family. We have the parental delinquency, misnamed juvenile delinquency, where the parents refuse any responsibility in training and rearing their family, and leave it up to the school and church to give the wayward children what little training they get.

Congress has just started to uncover preliminary scandals connected with grafting on war contracts, but like Congressman Ellsworth says, the ones uncovered now may be just a fire cracker compared with those which may be dug up later. And one member of congress remarked after hearing a lot of evidence on the so-called scandals that it looked to him like everybody tried to get to the government.

There are those who contend that everybody has his price, which means that nobody is honest. If this is so, then we've reached a pretty low state.
