Wheat Insurance From Government Now More Liberal

More protection at lower cost is afforded to wheat producers in many Oregon counties through the federal crop insurance now being offered on 1947 winter wheat, according to E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee. Insurance now on sale at county agricultural conservation offices for 1947 wheat is being written for new yields and at new premium rates. The revisions were made by the federal crop insurance corporation on the basis of new information on production and losses in the state.

All applications for 1947 winter wheat insurance must be filed before the crop is seeded and before September 28, the closing date for Oregon.

County average yields have been increased as much as five bushels per acre, and premium rates have been lowered in many counties, Miller reported. Insured yields for individual farms have been adjusted in accordance with the change in the county average yield.

The three-year contracts being written now will protect the wheat crops through 1949 against all unavoidable hazards, including flood, drought, hail, insects, frost, plant disease and fire. The contracts written for all 1946 wheat on 3,000 Oregon farms still have two more years to run. But many of these producers, Miller pointed out, will find it to their advantage to cancel their present contract by signing a new three-year contract at the 1947 revised yields and rates. Unless a new contract is signed, 1946 insurance will remain in effect for 1947 and 1948 at the old yields and rates.

13 Billion Board Ft. Timber Cut Is Visioned in No'west

"Most significant basic document in the history of the West Coast lumber industry is the just-released Burt P. Kirkland report on the forest resources of the Douglas fir region which shows this two-state forest capable of sustaining forever a forest harvest of 13 billion board feet every year," declared H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association at Portland. "This is far above the war-time drain of 9.4 billion feet on our region's forests."

"The Kirkland report on the Douglas fir region is part of a national forest re-appraisal made by the American Forestry Association of Washington, D. C. with the aid of private and public forest agencies," Simpson pointed out. "It deals with America's most important forest and therefore is a scientific document of highest national importance."

The lumber executive went on to point out that the 13 billion feet production from West Coast forest was entirely possible, that actually new-found facts indicate that a 20-billion-foot yield can be sustained perpetually once all our forest lands are in full growth and fully used.

Simpson put his finger on one sensational disclosure in the Kirkland report which shows an annual loss from rot and decay on the region's nine million acres of old

growth of three billion feet. "This staggering loss can be stopped," Simpson stated, "and is shocking evidence of the fallacy of hoarding vast stands of over-ripe, stagnant, non-growth producing forests under the guise of conservation. Kirkland recommends that these forests be worked over rapidly, by tree or area selection, taking out over-ripe timber and keeping the stand in net growing condition."

"These undisputed and new-found facts about our forest reservoir form a powerful incentive for continued expansion of industrial forestry," Simpson believes. He warned, however, that the federal government, which controls more than half the remaining virgin timber stands in the region, must adopt a more realistic and workable formula to achieve the potential vast production which the region's forest lands are fully able to grow. "The report shows we have a permanent industry, and we mean to make it larger," the lumber leader declared.

"We see in the Kirkland report a definite challenge and especially an outright bid to the Federal government to open up vast areas of dying old-growth and thus help reduce the three-billion-foot annual loss," Simpson stated. "This challenge is particularly strong at a time when private West Coast log supply is declining in some areas and long-established mills are being dismantled—all within plain sight of vast areas of government-owned reserves of virgin tim-

ber with trees rotting everywhere." To get his 13 billion-foot figure, Kirkland outlines and recommends an economically sound formula. From 320 billion feet of public and private timber operated on a sustained yield basis should come 3.2 billion feet; from 119 billion feet of private timber on a liquid-

ating basis could come 3 billion feet, but he recommends a combined formula of sustained-yield and liquidating which could produce 2.5 billion feet. So, with no change in the present degree of utilization or federal controls, he foresees an annual cut ranging from 5.7 billion feet perpetually if all the timber were managed for

sustained yield to 8.2 billion for the next twenty years only if the present proportions of sustained yield and liquidating forests are unchanged and use continues as in the past.
