

Influx of New Comers to Boost H. S. Enrollment

With the influx of many new comers into Southern Lane County additional students are expected to enroll in the Cottage Grove Union High School and school authorities urge that all students pre-register next week in order to facilitate the efficient beginning of another school year. On Wednesday and Thursday of next week registration will be held for all students, but actual class work will not begin until Monday morning, September 9. All freshmen are to register Wednesday afternoon from 2:00 to 4:30 p. m.; juniors Wednesday evening from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.; sophomores Thursday afternoon from 2:00 to 4:30 p. m.; and seniors Thursday evening from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.

Student fees will be collected at this time along with the purchase of student-body tickets.

Book fees will be \$1.00 a course, towel fees \$1.00, and locker deposit 50 cents for a total of \$5.50 for a student taking a normal course of four subjects, with physical education and health. Student-body tickets will be sold at \$2.50 apiece. These will include admittance to all home athletic games, two pay assemblies, social events, and subscription to the school newspaper.

Because of lack of housing facilities there is still a shortage in the teaching staff. A man who has accepted the coaching position will not sign a contract until he is assured of a place to live. The school board desires anyone having suitable accommodations to notify at once the high school office.

The course of study for the year will be broadened somewhat with new offerings in aeronautics, commercial subjects, and instrumental music, with special emphasis upon science and health instruction.

More time will be given to band and instrumental music under the direction of F. D. Hollister who has made an enviable record in this field in schools in Oregon and Nevada. It is hoped that students interested in playing band instruments will register in either beginning band or advanced band. Anyone in the community having available band instruments should contact the new band instructor as there is a shortage of instruments at the present time.

English: 1, 2, 3, 4, Public Speaking, Library Training, Journalism, and Creative Expression.

Foreign Languages: Spanish 1, 2.

Mathematics: elementary algebra, general mathematics, geometry.

Sciences: general science, biology, chemistry, aeronautics.

Social Studies: elementary social science, United States History and government, socio-economic problems, World Cultures.

Commercial: Typing 1, shorthand 1, shorthand-typing 2, bookkeeping, advanced business science.

Home economics: Homemaking 1, 2, 3.

Agriculture: 1, 2, 3-4 (Animals, crops, and projects).

Industrial arts: General shop 1, 2, 3.

Physical education and health: 1, 2, 3, 4.

Music: Choral singing, beginning and advanced band, voice, piano, violin, by private instruction.

NEW SEWERAGE DISPOSAL REGULATION

Effective October 15th, the 200 and 300 gallon septic tanks can no longer be used in a private sewerage disposal plant according to a regulation passed by the Oregon State Board of Health at its meeting July 31st. After October 15th, the total capacity of the septic tank must be 500 gallons. This date was set by the health board in order to permit dealers to dispose of their existing stocks of tanks.

Advancement Plans Made at Dist. Scout Meet Here

Plans were discussed for the organization of a new Boy Scout troop at Lorane and the formation of a senior outpost for boys ages 15 to 18 at the regular meeting of the South Lane Boy Scout district here Tuesday evening at the city hall.

Present from Eugene were: Harold Shearer, field executive and Dr. C. H. Michel, chairman of Boy Scout extension and review. Four members of the Row River troop were also present: L. S. Hird, Frank Bloomer, C. Howell and Keet LeCompte.

Harold Shearer, executive and Lance Naish of the local committee have recently completed a leader's training course at Row River and are planning a similar course here. Leaders attending the meeting Tuesday expressed a hope that a new scout troop might be organized at Lorane by early fall. Attention was called to the merit badge show, which will be held at the McArthur court in Eugene in November.

The Rev. George Hardy, who is leaving soon for Portland resigned as institutional representative of troop 60 and W. C. Martin was named as his successor.

Softball Season Is Probably Ended

The softball season is probably over, ending in about a four or possibly a five way tie. When Knickerbockers went to the state tournament in Oregon City Friday, the league here was in a three way tie between Knickerbocker's, Quality Market and the Eagles, but Knicks didn't show up to play against Harold's Motor Clinic Monday night, since about half the players remained in Oregon City to see the state tournament. So the season may end with this situation. Tommy Cox could not be reached for a statement early this morning, but so far as known, no decision has been reached as to whether the playoff will be held. Opinion expressed here was that the season had ended.

Knickerbocker's had the misfortune of going up against what is conceded to be the best team in the state in their first game of the state tourney at Oregon City Friday night when they met and were defeated by the Hudson Duncans nine 14 to 0. The opposition might be more aptly described as too much pitcher. Thirteen errors on the part of Knicks also aided their downfall, but the boys all agreed that the Hudson Duncans pitcher was just too fast and he has since proved the statement by carrying his team into the semifinals and Tuesday fanned 21 men on a Medford team to help his teammates down the southern city 4 to 0.

Fred Anderson, sponsor of the Quality Market team is remaining over in Oregon city to see the final outcome of the state tournament.

EDMONDS TO DIRECT OPA

Appointment of T. J. Edmonds, of Portland, as director of the Oregon District OPA, effective Monday was announced Sunday by Regional Administrator Ben C. Dunlavy, San Francisco.

Edmonds, who has been serving as deputy district director, will take the place of McDannell Brown who resigned in July to resume the private practice of law. Meantime, Verne Livesay, OPA's Pacific Regional Agricultural Advisor, has been serving as acting district director.

The Oregon OPA district includes all of Oregon except Malheur County, and includes five counties in southwestern Washington.

S. P. ANNOUNCES ORDERS FOR 1000 MORE BOX CARS

Although Southern Pacific Company already has ordered within the past 18 months a total of more than 4,000 new freight train cars, the purchase of an additional 1,000 box cars of modern design to help ease the national box car shortage has been announced by President A. T. Mercier. The new cars will be steel sheathed, wood lined, forty-foot and of fifty-ton capacity.

Due to labor and material shortages experienced by car builders, deliveries of cars presently outstanding on order were only commenced in recent weeks and 1,160 have been delivered to August 10, Mercier said. The balance of deliveries is scheduled for completion within the next 90 days.

OPA Ceilings on Livestock Upped

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson yesterday directed OPA to establish ceilings on livestock calling for increases of \$1.40 per hundred pounds on hogs and \$2.25 for cattle, Chicago basis, over the limits in effect June 30.

The new ceilings will be: hogs \$16.25 per hundred pounds, Chicago basis, compared with \$14.85 on June 30 when the old price control law expired.

Cattle: Overriding ceiling, Chicago basis, \$20.25 per hundred pounds compared with \$18 on June 30, with maximum stabilization ranges of \$19.25 on choice, \$17.75 on good, and \$13 on commercial grades.

Lambs: Ceilings on dressed lamb which would reflect about \$19 per hundred pounds, Chicago basis.

Agriculture department officials estimated these increases would raise retail prices of pork an average of between 2.5 and 3 cents a pound and beef about 6 cents.

A department official said he had "no knowledge" that Anderson's action had been approved by the OPA. Officials of both agencies have reported, however, that there was a difference between the two agencies with the OPA opposing increases favored by Anderson.

Housewives got a mixture of good and bad news from OPA late yesterday. They were told that the present limit of five pounds of sugar for each ration stamp must continue during the next four months of this year and at least the beginning of next. Spare Stamp No. 51 will become valid September 1, but OPA granted a 30-day extension on stamp No. 49.

Umpqua Forest Fire Still Defies 300 Fire Fighters

A 300 acre fire at the headwaters of Rock Creek about fifty miles east of Roseburg was still unchecked yesterday according to word from Roseburg, but timely rains this morning are believed to have aided three hundred men in a battle to check the flames. Most of the fire was trailed yesterday, although it was said to be jumping from snag to snag. Fog made it impossible to drop supplies to the 300 fighters yesterday morning.

Conflicting reports said the fire had covered an area of from 800 to 1500 acres. The forest service planned to establish a 75 man camp on the west side of the fire today. Many men from the Douglas Fire Patrol are fighting the blaze along with men of the forest service, loggers and mill crews.

AAF Top Secrets to Be Displayed in Eugene Sept. 11th

The United States Air Force secret equipment show which is currently touring the Pacific Coast arrived in Eugene for a showing on September 11th and will be there for four days. This huge display will be located at the city park and will run daily from noon to ten p. m.

The Air Force Mobile Unit is an educational display designed to allow the general public to see what equipment was used in winning the battle of the sky. Such equipment that up to now had only been heard of can be seen, operated, and explained by Army Personnel with the display. The War Department feels that the general public should have the opportunity of seeing the finest Air Equipment ever designed, and the unit will be laid out in such a manner that the public can have easy access to all of the displays.

Spectators at this free show will get a chance to operate the famed automatic pilot, the bullet-proof Martin turreted, the latest in machine guns, weather forecasting equipment, radio receiver and transmitter.

One of the feature exhibits of the show is a specially mounted board with all the essential controls for a B-29 bombing run. Visitors will be able to operate the automatic pilot and watch the functioning of the compact mechanism through special transparent cases. A bomb sight is also mounted on the control board and spectators may simulate the dropping of a bomb on simulated targets. Miniature plane wings, rudders and elevators which move, give the "pilot" a sense of reality.

Councilmen also discussed the plans and specifications for sewer extension on Tenth street, connecting the new residential district. The specifications were on exhibit at this time. It was also announced that the Perrin property on Monroe Ave. and south 5th street will be placed up to the highest bidder. Part of the building is to be razed before the property is put up for bids.

The council also discussed hauling over the city streets and appointed a committee to investigate to see what could be done to preserve the streets.

Biggest State Fair Since 1941 Will Open Labor Day

Billed as the biggest and best in history, Oregon's first state fair since 1941 will open in Salem on Labor day. Over \$50,000 in agricultural and livestock premiums will be awarded during the fair week of Sept. 2 to 8.

Manager Leo Spitzbarts has reported the fair grounds to be in the best shape in many years. All of the buildings have been repainted, inside and out, and the extensive floral beds on the grounds are expected to be in full bloom by Labor day.

The entertainment roster is the most varied to be presented at the fair. Pari-mutuel horse racing will begin Labor day and continue through Saturday with two harness races and seven running events to be presented on each daily card. Big car auto racing will make its first appearance on the fair program Sunday afternoon, Sept. 8, when some of the Pacific Coast's top drivers compete for sizeable purses on Lone Oak track.

Jimmie Grier's orchestra, musical hosts of the coast, will come north from Catalina Island to play nightly at the state fair revue and the evening dances. The revue, which will be staged in front of the racing grandstand each night, will boast of nationally famed vaudeville acts and the Helene Hughes' Precision Dancers, sixteen beautiful girls direct from Hollywood.

The evening horse show will be combined for the first time with selected rodeo competition. All of the old horse show classifications have been retained. Leading riders of the Pacific Coast will compete in the rodeo, which will include bulldogging, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, and Brahma bull riding. Admission to the grounds will be at the pre-war level of fifty cents with children 14 and under to be admitted free.

STORES TO CLOSE LABOR DAY

Shoppers should hold in mind the fact that local stores will be closed next Monday, which is labor day. So far as could be determined by a partial survey made here yesterday all stores will be closed as in former years.
