Copper Sulphate Shows Promise in Fruit Crack Work

A new lead on the old problem of how to prevent cherries and prunes from cracking when rain occurs during the ripening period is reported by Dr. W. L. Powers, head of the soils department at Oregon State college. His latest findings have just been submitted in a paper to the magazine "Science," with W. B. Bollen, associate bacteriologist, as joint author.

Dr. Powers has been experimenting for some years with boron applications to the soil in cherry and prune orchards, with some promising but inconclusive results. This season he added immersion tests with various chemicals including boron.

Ripe cherries submerged in a boron solution showed much less cracking than those in plain water, but even so 50 per cent cracked in 48 hours, compared with 100 per cent cracks in plain water.

Cherries immersed in a dilute solution of copper sulphate, however, came through the test with no cracking after 48 hours, which first led Dr. Powers to believe some yeast or mold organism might be involved. Careful tests by Dr. Bollen failed to confirm this, however.

Although the season was nearly over, some tests were made on a cherry tree by applying a .1 per cent copper sulphate spray as a protection in advance of a prolonged water spray to simulate rain. Only 1 per cent of the protected fruit cracked compared with 6 per cent on untreated parts of the tree. This type of test is to be tried on a larger scale with prunes.

If these tests show a protective spray of copper sulphate to be as beneficial as now indicated, Dr. Powers believes the material may have a toughening effect on the fruit skin comparable to that of tannin on leather.

Cracking caused by a rain early in July is estimated to have cost Oregon cherry growers close to a million dollars this year.
