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WE DON'T LIKE TO WRITE OBITUARIES

Traffic accidents are on the increase at the beginning of the fall season. We are afraid that we are going to have to chronicle a lot more deaths in the next few months than is necessary, if auto drivers and especially the young ones don't exercise more caution. Fifty miles per hour on a lot of our narrow streets is hazardous driving even under normal conditions, but with wet slippery streets, the hazard is increased ten fold. We have seen driving on all streets at excessive speeds recently. Drivers up to now have been fortunate or perhaps providence has been on their side, because as this is written no serious accidents have occurred. That does not mean that we will go through the winter without any deaths. And death may come to the innocent driver who is obeying traffic regulations.

The police department has promised pedestrian lanes on the principal intersections of Main street as well as other safety measures as soon as materials are available.

South Fifth street by the Jefferson school should be protected by both pedestrian lanes as well as stop streets. We have seen a few motorists speed down Fifth forty to fifty miles per hour. What chance has a motorist to escape in crossing Fifth under these conditions? Only today we heard a man remark that if a few stiff fines were assessed against the speeders, it would put a damper on some of the reckless driving. There are lots of people who might not like the idea of stiff fines, but from a money standpoint fines are still cheaper than funerals.

Another good suggestion made at a recent session of the city planning board was by a member of the city council, who favors removal of parking strips along the main travel streets. The space occupied by the parking lots, which he says are not usually kept up would be used to widen the streets. Cars parked along narrow streets at night are particularly dangerous. Police say they have warned motorists in several instances, but so far warnings have not accomplished much.

JUNIOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

We understand there is soon to be organized a Junior Chamber of Commerce. Under normal conditions, if we were asked for suggestions we would suggest that there are already in existence too many clubs and organizations and that the community as a whole would be better off and would certainly be able to cooperate more wholeheartedly in community enterprises if about fifty per cent of the present organizations were disbanded. And we might be tempted to question the wisdom of organizing a Junior Chamber of Commerce here except for the fact that this organization will be composed of young men, who we hope will be earnest enough in their purpose to accomplish much good, good that the senior Chamber of Commerce has had opportunity to do in its forty years of existence, but has not. And we make this statement at the risk of being run out of town. And such a statement is no reflection on the present officials nor the board of directors of the senior Chamber of Commerce, the majority of whom would like to see the methods of the senior organization modernized. But where leading members publicly remark as we have heard them do so that no new industries should be encouraged to come into Cottage Grove because such industries might cause labor strife or might ruin our hunting and fishing, then we contend that the application of the term, "Chamber of Commerce," is most certainly a misnomer.

If the junior Chamber of Commerce works at the job, it will make mistakes; but if it adopts an aggressive policy such as we believe it will, we can overlook a few mistakes. Aggressive action will be welcome.

Canning Food for School Lunch Big Help Financially

School lunch sponsoring groups in Oregon have an opportunity this fall to increase their food supplies and low cost by promoting "canning bees" for the benefit of the lunch program, points out Lucy Case, extension nutritionist at Oregon State college.

Miss Case has compiled a mimeographed circular on canning for the school lunch which gives many suggestions on organizing and conducting home canning operations for the benefit of the local school program. Copies may be had free from any extension office.

"Although congress has appropriated funds to cooperate with states in conducting these school lunch programs, such money will pay for only a fraction of the food needed," says Miss Case. "As food is more expensive this year than before, many sponsoring groups will find it more difficult than ever to serve well balanced meals without help from home canning."

Miss Case says a good canning goal for tomatoes, for example, is six quarts of tomatoes and tomato juice for each pupil who stays for the noon lunch. This would be 300 quarts for 50 pupils. Tomatoes are among the most nutritious of all canned foods and require no sugar nor special canning equipment.

Where sugar is needed for canning fruits for school lunch purposes, information can be obtained from the sugar rationing division, OPA district office, 1022 Bedell Bldg., Portland. Where sponsors did not apply for sugar last year

it will be necessary to explain in full this year's canning program and sugar needs, Miss Case adds. Where non-acid foods are to be canned for the school lunch use of a pressure canner is the only safe procedure, she says. Information on safe canning methods for all types of foods may be had from any county home demonstration agent's office. The school lunch circular is HE 1952, "Canning for the School Lunch."

No 1947 Letdown in Farm Acreage Seen for Oregon

Continued maximum farm production is in prospect for Oregon, according to a report on agricultural production capacity for 1947 prepared at the request of the Secretary of Agriculture by a state college committee headed by E. L. Potter, chief of the division of agricultural economics. This is the fifth in a series of such annual reports dealing with production adjustments in Oregon agriculture.

Prices of most farm products are still high enough to encourage maximum production even though the general outlook is for gradually lower farm income. The acute labor shortage has been particularly relieved and while machinery will continue to be scarce, its chief effect is expected to be on hay production. The freight car shortage may delay movement of feed grains into the state and other products out.

Taking up individual crops, the report forecasts a decrease in potatoes, a slight decrease in total acreage of grain crops and a reduction in flax for fiber. Increases are foreseen in summer fallow acreage, truck crops for processing, and sod crops including a big increase in alfalfa clover for seed in response to demand. Hairy vetch and winter peas are expected to increase significantly.

Dairy cattle numbers may stay at present levels with an improved feed-milk price ratio while beef cattle numbers are likely to decline somewhat. Sheep numbers are low and a gradual upturn is considered desirable. Hog numbers probably will not reach prewar levels for some time because of less skim milk available and world demand for wheat as human food.

An unfavorable egg-feed ratio is expected to further reduce egg output while commercial broiler production may continue its upward trend. Some recovery in turkey numbers is expected from this season's drastic slump.
