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CLEARING OUT THE COMMUNISTS

If Capitol observers know what they are talking about, there will be a mighty effort within the next few months to separate communists from government jobs. J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI is quoted as saying that we are nearer the days of gang control than we were after the first world war. He told the American Legion convention that we are fighting two fronts, one the crime front, where crime is increasing daily, and the other is the growing menace of the communists.

These communists have bored into important government jobs. At one time there was a rush of the revolutionary elements to get jobs in the international agencies as UNRRA and the Bretton Woods establishments.

The prime objectives of the top communists are said to be to break down the moral law through the degradation of money, to paralyze large industry and to destroy circulation of money by involving the government in unbearable expenses and the last objective is the prime one—to make money worthless.

The situation is serious enough that the chances are good both democrats and republicans will insist on an investigation.

NOW IS THE TIME

Again we want to point out that opportunity knocks often but once and its knocking at our door so far as securing funds needed for construction of a hospital. While it might not be possible to get the needed building material immediately, it would be a splendid time to start a fund so that construction might start at the earliest practical time.

Under a recent federal law, half the cost of the building will be supplied, leaving only fifty per cent to be furnished by individuals or by the municipality. Perhaps you had never thought of it, but the population of this trading area is estimated at 20,000. That means 20,000 people must be served by the Eugene hospital, which is already overcrowded, or some outside hospital. As matters stand now one hospital serves approximately 90,000 people. (This is the estimate of the Lane county population at present).

WILL THIS BE "THE LAST GENERATION,"

Just what do the people of the world think when they read reports to the effect that some of the principal military and political leaders believe that a third World War is as inevitable as the rising and setting of the sun? What do they think when they see peace conferences degenerate into impotency because the old game of power politics is being played as ruthlessly as ever?

Here at home, we read that our armed forces are vigorously pushing the development of new weapons of unimaginable destructive force—including some that may prove to be more militarily effective than the atomic bomb. This is, of course, the plain duty of our military chiefs. They must prepare for the worst, and as rapidly as they can. And in the meantime, some of the nations seem to be doing everything possible to make certain that those weapons will be used, and soon.

At the end of World War I, there was much talk of "the lost generation." The problem at the end of World War II seems to be whether or not this shall be "the last generation." If we once more permit the world to resort to force of arms, no nation and no individual will escape the awful consequences.

SEC. 3.
