GROUND FORCES WINTER EQUIPMENT TEST IN ARCTIC
Winter's cold and snow, as illustrated here, will be a daily companion to 4,000 Army Ground Forces troops taking part in winter equipment tests to be held in Alaska and Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, between October 1 and April 30, 1947. Three separate task forces will determine the extent to which existing equipment will function and what new equipment is required for the ground team to fight under all winter conditions. Task forces "Williwaw" and "Frigid" are being assembled for early departure for Adak, Alaska, and Fairbanks, Alaska, while task force "Frost" already is at Camp McCoy. Left, equipped with heavy clothing to offset extremes of cold the pictured soldier is representative of 4,000 Ground Forces troops to test equipment in Alaska and at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin. Right, in a practical test showing a patient being brought to a first aid station on an improvised litter toboggan.

Record Number of Phones Installed Since VJ Day

N. R. Powley, president of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, in his quarterly statement to shareholders released September 30, made a comprehensive statement concerning volume of business, the rehabilitation and expansion program, increase in number of telephones, and earnings, as follows:
"Embarking as it did in the latter months of 1945 on its largest rehabilitation and expansion program in its history, our company has made gross plant additions in the first eight months of this year of more than \$70,850,000, averaging more than \$8,856,000 monthly. It is now estimated that these additions for the year will aggregate \$130,000,000, thus exceeding by \$55,000,000, or more than 73 percent, our previous highest yearly gross plant additions in 1941 aggregating \$75,000,000.

"Our net telephone increase in the first eight months of this year totals more than 253,000 telephones and since V-J Day the increase has been more than 324,000 telephones. The eight months' increase exceeds by more than 119,000 telephones, or 89 percent, the combined increase of the more than 134,000 telephones for the years 1944 and 1945. The increase since V-J Day exceeds by more than 137,000 telephones, or 73 percent, the increase of the more than 187,000 telephones in the year 1943, the highest of record for any year we have ever experienced.

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FBI on Job
FBI statistics show that 7,992 stolen automobiles valued at \$5,402,439 were recovered by the bureau and 2,418 car thieves were convicted in 1945. Investigations under the White Slave Traffic act resulted in 338 convictions.

Synthetic perfume materials, many of which stem from bituminous coal, have largely replaced natural essences due to the high quality of the synthetics.

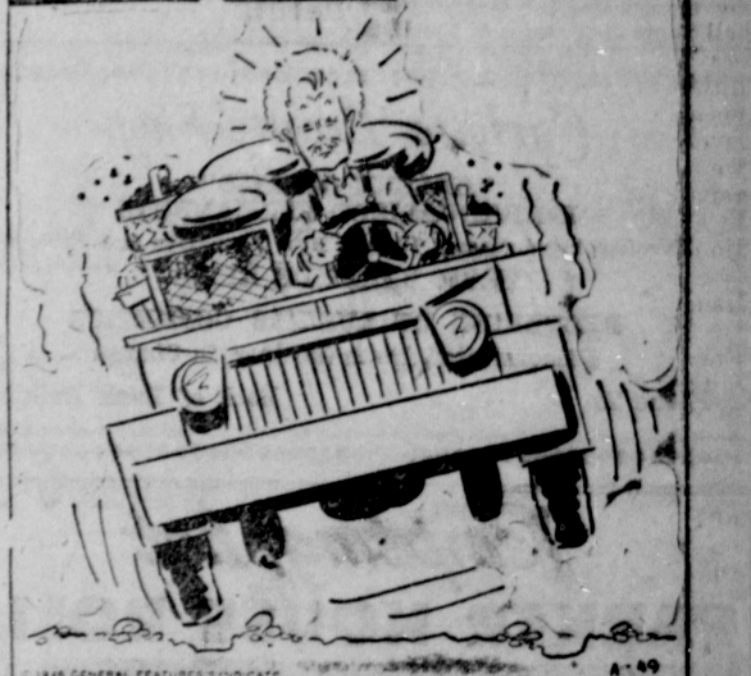
Light Reflex
