The 15 per cent meat price boost authorized by OPA applies to all eating places, from hamburger joints on. It covers all meats in which meat is the major ingredient.

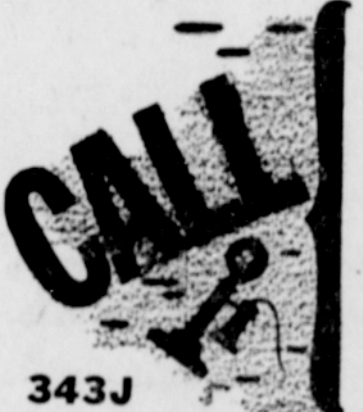

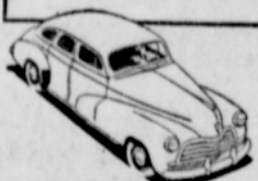

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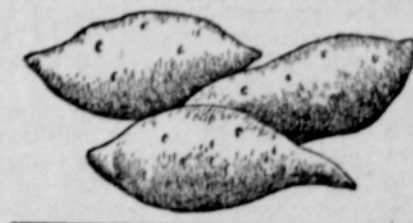
