FORMER RESIDENT PASSES AWAY AT DALLAS

Funeral services were held here at the Church of Christ Thursday for Mrs. Frances Almeda Smith, former resident, who passed away Monday of last week in Dallas. Interment was at Oakland, Ore.

Mrs. Smith was born June 13, 1871 in Mound City, Kansas and came to Oregon with her parents in 1875. They lived first at Empire, and then moved to Oakland. She was married in 1888 at Roseburg to Wesley Smith, who died in 1942 at Drain.

OSC Nears 7,000 Mark as Veterans Crowd on Campus

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A total registration of more than 7000 students was assured at OSC for the fall term when enrollment reached 6824 before the start of classes, with late comers and many graduate students still to register.

This early total was 2 1/2 times that of the comparable date a year ago and was more than 2000 above the previous high mark of 4759 set the fall term of 1940. The huge increase, though not unexpected, sent deans and administrators scurrying to get additional teaching help for such crowded departments as English and mathematics.

More than half of the total, or 4220, are veterans, including 109 ex-service women. Only two of the veterans are receiving state educational aid, all the remainder choosing the more liberal federal provisions.

Men outnumber women more than 2 1/2 to 1 even though the co-ed enrollment is also at a record high. The freshman class totals 3157, sophomores 2227, Juniors 672 and seniors 642. New students number 2973 and old 3851.

Engineering is by far the largest school with 1676, followed by business and industry with 1045. More than 1000 are enrolled in lower division where a major is not chosen until after the sophomore year. Agriculture is third among the schools with 882 followed by home economics, 604, science 576.

Herman Goering Cheats Gallows

NUERNBERG, Germany—Herman Goering, who ended his life mysteriously in the agony of poison, and ten other top Nazis who died on a hangman's rope were taken to nameless graves on the bleak, cold morning of October 16th in final expiation for the colossal crimes of Germany.

Grim and manacled because in some unexplained fashion Goering had been able to escape the ignominy of the gallows, Joachim von Ribbentrop started the death marches and plunged to eternity at 1:14 A. M. (4:14 P. M. Tuesday Pacific time).

Arthur Seys-Inquart was dead at 2:57 A. M. just an hour and 43 minutes after the once dapper German foreign minister had pulled the 13 coils of noose placed by Master Sgt. John C. Wood of the United States Army.

The other eight climbed the 13 black steps one by one, dying alternately on twin gallows set up to speed the grisly task ordered by the International Military Tribunal of the United States, Russia, Great Britain and France.

Goering, even by his death less than two hours before the execution, did not escape the shadow of the gallows.

While Seys-Inquart and Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl still were twitching with the last faint sparks of life, the body of Goering was brought in on a stretcher and placed between the gallows in symbolic execution. The generals representing the allied control council were allowing no legend to spring up that the German who once was out-ranked only by Hitler had escaped death.

The blanket was removed and there lay the former reichsmarschal, clad garishly in soaking wet pajamas and a jacket. Physicians had used water in attempts to revive him. His face was contorted with the pain of his last agony. He had swallowed a vial of cyanide of potassium, which kills swiftly. Just as Heinrich Himmler did at the end of the war in which countless millions died, victims of the Nazi system the 11 ring leaders represented.

How Goering got the poison, kept it and took it were mysteries the shrunken fat man perhaps took to his grave.
