Ellsworth Names 8 Candidates for Army Navy Schools

Congressman Harris Ellsworth today announced the appointment of eight Fourth District boys as principals and alternates to fill vacancies at the U. S. Naval and Military Academies. Nominations were based on grades earned by candidates in a competitive examination given in July this year.

The appointments announced by Ellsworth were as follows: Nathaniel B. Bender, Jr., Alan D. Kircher, principals, Thomas D. Colley, first alternate, all of Medford, for the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.; Richard C. Stanton, Grants Pass, Conrad J. Hogen, and Edwin R. Kiser, Coos Bay, principals, LeRoy House, Jr., Medford, and Darrel D. Spores, Springfield, first alternates, for the Military Academy at West Point, N. Y.

Those principals, or alternates succeeding them, who meet final entrance requirements will enter the academies in July 1947.
