Regular meeting of the Neighbors of Woodcraft will be held in the IOOF hall on Tuesday November 5.

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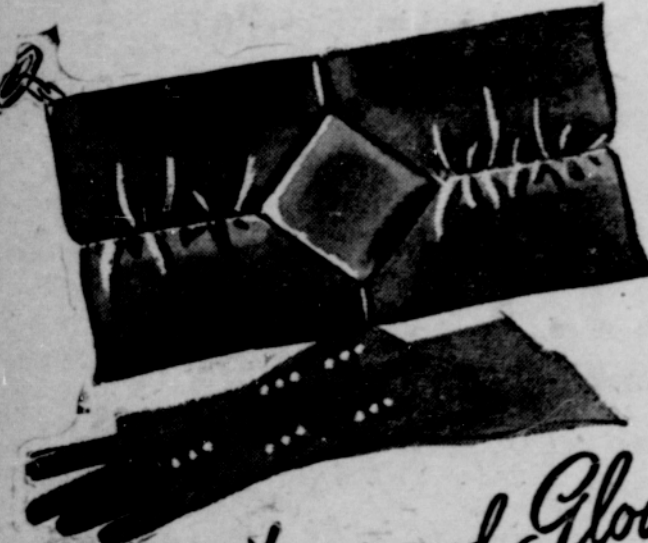
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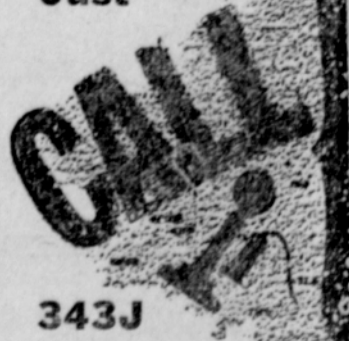
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
