Plain Economics Caused Meat Lack Lindgren States

Oregon livestock producers have not been creating a meat shortage by withholding fat cattle and hogs from the market in anticipation of higher prices, declares H. A. Lindgren, O. S. C. extension animal husbandman. The basic trouble with the meat situation has been a disparity between prices of feed grains and the price of livestock, the specialist states.

The controlled grain prices have been too high to encourage feeding, Lindgren explains. Grass-fat cattle have gone to market at the normal time this fall. Feedlots, however, were not filled prior to the removal of price ceilings on cattle. From three to five months will be required to finish cattle for market now going on feed.

Yearling steers, require about 100 days of feeding, during which they consume about 2,400 pounds of hay and 800 pounds of grain. Weaner calves require about 150 days feeding, during which they eat about a ton of hay and a half-ton of grain. Cattle going on feed now will replenish market supplies of fat stock beginning about the first of the year if livestock prices maintain a fair relationship to feed costs, the specialist concludes.

The hog situation is similar, Lindgren adds. Oregon farmers need to sell 100 pounds of pork, live weight on the farm, for a price equivalent to 550 pounds of grain if they are to break even. This fall grain has been selling for three cents a pound, or more, meaning that an average price of 19½ cents a pound for hogs on the farm has been necessary for the feeder to avoid a loss. The hog ceiling was 17.2 cents.

Hogs now going on feed will be ready for market in 60 to 70 days. Reduced herds will limit the number of animals in feedlots this fall, however, and the greater share of the needed increase in fat hogs for market will have to come from next spring's pig crop, Lindgren predicts.

Tariff on Lumber Ordered Removed

President Truman Friday ordered suspension of tariffs on timber, lumber, and lumber products needed to relieve the housing emergency.

Mr. Truman by proclamation declared an unprecedented housing emergency which authorizes the secretary of the treasury to permit duty-free importation of any articles certified by Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt as "timber, lumber, or lumber products suitable for the construction or completion of housing accommodations."

Duration of Order.

The suspension will continue until the Veterans Emergency Housing Act of 1946 expires or until the president ends the emergency. Mr. Truman acted under the emergency housing law.

Mr. Truman said a long-term housing shortage had created an unprecedented emergency, particularly for veterans of World War II and their families.

"It is imperative that immediate action be taken on a temporary basis to increase the available supplies of timber, lumber, and lumber products for housing purposes," his proclamation said.

Further details on the President's order were not immediately obtainable, but authoritative sources in Washington indicated that it would likely result in increased importations of Canadian lumber and timber products.

Timber Measuring Guide in Farm Forest Bulletin

A circular to help farm timber owners estimate the actual log value of timber they have for sale has been issued at O. S. C. as extension circular 490, "Measuring Volume of Trees and Logs," by Dan D. Robinson, former extension forester.

Farmers often realize only a fraction of the real market value of wood products because most farm timber is sold on a stumpage basis for a lump sum, says Robinson in this circular. By estimating their own timber volume, farm owners can more nearly realize maximum cash returns from standing timber or from cut poles, piling, pulpwood, sawlogs, and the like.

Registration in Ore. Is 593,542

The number of persons eligible to vote in Oregon's general election next Tuesday is 593,542, the largest off-year registration in history and the second highest on record, the state department announced yesterday at Salem.

The total is 8,471 less than in the 1944 general election, but that was a presidential year, when registration always hits the peak.

There are 300,201 Republicans and 280,304 Democrats registered. That, compared with the general election two years ago, is a Republican gain of 10,000.

The total registration is 41,789 greater than the total for this year's primary election, and 59,020 greater than for the 1942 general election, the last off-year election before this year's.
