The boys said the girl stood up in the boat. It overturned, hurling all four into the water.

Sgt. R. M. Miles, state police officer at Reedsport, and E. M. Clyde, Ada, rescued the three boys. They were unable to save the girl, whose body was recovered at 11 a. m.

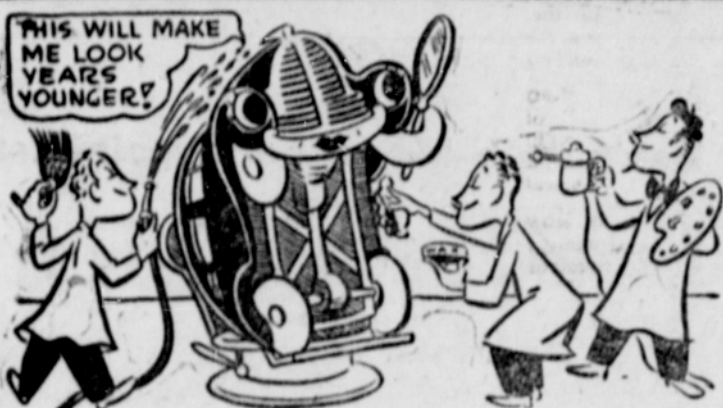
