Ex-Student Witnesses Typhoons While Enroute to Guam, Shanghai

Charles Marsh, F1/C, former student of Cottage Grove is now on the cruiser Los Angeles (ca 135). He joined the navy last January and is now in Hawaii. In a recent letter he gave a rough schedule of what he has been doing in the past two months.

The first of September L. A. left Tsingtoz en route for Guam. The trip took five days under ideal weather conditions. It was very exciting for all the boys when they anchored in Apra Harbor. It was hard to realize that only 2 years ago the island was under Japanese control and a scene of heavy fighting.

Shortly after they arrived in Guam they were put in quarantine and the only visits ashore were recreation parties that were sent to Gob Gob beach.

A few days before they reached Guam they saw a movie "Guam! Paradise of the Pacific." It showed golden beaches with husky men and waves, but they all agreed that the island had changed very suddenly, much to their despair, because they hoped to see a good "American babe."

Guam gave them a hearty welcome and they picked up 71 men to join the ship and some were taken off to return home to the good old U.S.A.

The first liberty party left the ship on Labor day. They all went to Hoover Beach where they enjoyed the tropic sunshine to get a nice tan.

On some of the ships dunnies are their uniforms, but not on the L. A. their specialty are shorts especially in that climate.

On the seventh of Sept. they received a typhoon warning. They had fifteen minutes to get ready for it and were prepared for the worst, but fortunately nothing happened.

The twelfth the L. A. accompanied by the Topeka and Bremerton left Apra Harbor for Pagan Island for firing practice. Pagan is a small, rugged little island that is 1800 ft. active volcano. The boys saw Mt. Pagan from the decks.

The ship did a lot of rolling on the night of the 14th. A storm had hit. Many of the boys were red eyed the next day from lack of sleep.

Another typhoon warning was received the 21st, so they set sail and were way south of Guam when the typhoon hit. The radio stations went off the air and the storm did little damage.

A real day of leisure was spent by everyone on Sunday, the 23rd. A bulletin was received that made 41 boys very happy. They were eligible for discharge. A total of 128 men were discharged from the L. A., Topeka and Bremerton. Fourteen of the men will be transferred from the L. A. for immediate transportation home at Pearl Harbor. Everyone wished them the best of luck and wished they were going with them.

Hatuey, a pet dog of the first Division, had a big thrill on the

24th. She had her picture taken with Captain Carter.

The boys must be careful not to waste water. Fresh water is scarce and they have to be very conservative.

The ship has its athletics and are planning to organize a football team when they get to China. They will there play tournaments with various teams.

Hatuey again comes into the picture on the 25th, when she was taken to sick bay where she received a shot and is now as lively as ever.

They went in dry docks in Pearl Harbor the 29th for repairs.

The fellows have had nice liberties since they have been in Hawaii for the past month, but complain, "It's hard on the pocket book."

They are now almost ready to shove off for Shanghai, China where they will swelter from the heat.

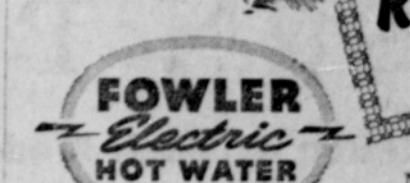

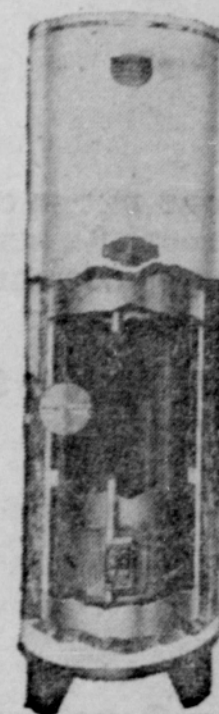

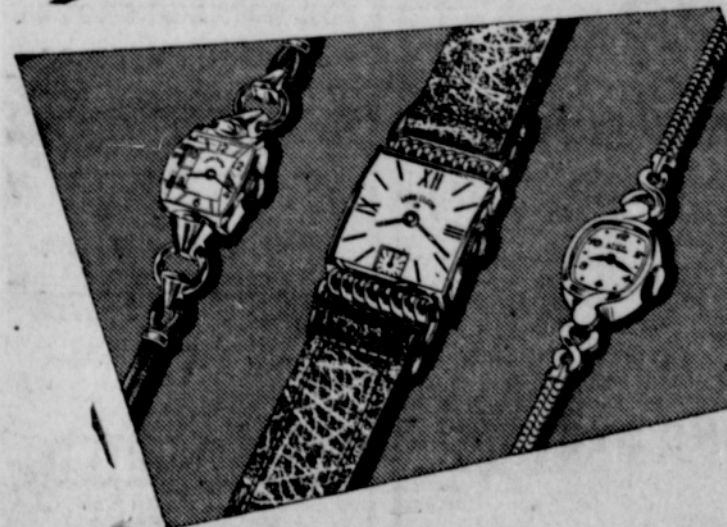
