MRS. LOUISA HORDING DIES AT CORVALLIS

Mrs. Louisa Myra Hording, for 27 years a resident of Corvallis, died Saturday noon, December 14, at a Corvallis hospital. The funeral services were held at 11:00 o'clock Tuesday, December 17, in the chapel of the Keeney Funeral Home with the Rev. R. Wilbur Simmons officiating. Interment was in the Walker cemetery.

Mrs. Hording, the daughter of Ellis and Marie E. Blackwell, was born in Geneseo, Illinois, July 23, 1866. When she was 12 years old she traveled by ox team, with her parents to Missouri and later the family moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado. After seven years there, she came to Oregon and at Gardiner was married to Ira L. Hording. Mr. Hording died at Cottage Grove in 1911. In 1915 Mrs. Hording went to Corvallis and had since made that her home. She was a member of the Presbyterian church and the Woman's Benefit Association. While her health permitted she was active in Red Cross work.

Surviving are two sons, Ellis B. and R. M. Hording of Corvallis; two daughters, Mrs. Doris Freeman of Jefferson and Mrs. Grace Whittington of Portland; three grandchildren, Marian and Ralph Hording of Corvallis and Ernest Freeman of Jefferson.
