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How to Make Soap

If you are having trouble getting soap these days or paying higher prices for it when you can get it, you should have a talk with your grandmother. She knew how to make her own soap like you know how to make pancakes, and without much bother.

But if she doesn't remember, here is just about the way she made it and the way you can make it today at the cost of a cent or two a cake. All you need is a can of good quality lye, such as Lehigh, Eagle, American Indian Head, or Dixie, which you can get at your corner grocery store, and six pounds of clean grease, lard or tallow.

Slowly empty the contents of the lye can into two and a half pints of cold water in an enamelware or iron vessel (never use aluminum ware). Stir until the lye is dissolved. It will heat up. Then cool it to room temperature (about 70 degrees).

Then melt the six pounds of fat and let it cool sufficiently so that you can hold your hand in it (about 100 degrees) or until the fat offers resistance to a spoon. Add the cooled lye solution to the grease in a small steady stream with slow even stirring. Pouring the lye in too fast or stirring too

vigorously is apt to cause a separation of ingredients.

Continue the stirring until the mixture becomes thick and syrupy, then pour it into a mould. A wooden or heavy cardboard box lined with a damp cloth is best. Cover this with a blanket or carpet and let it set in a warm room for several days, then cut it up into the size cakes you want. Age 10 days to two weeks.

One important thing—your fats must be clean. Salt and other impurities can be removed by boiling the grease in water and skimming it off the top after it cools. The soap you get from this recipe will be suitable for toilet, dish washing or laundry use. If desired, it can be perfumed or colored. This mixture makes about nine pounds of soap.

Remember how the economic tinkers kept worrying us through the thirties with their theory that our industrial frontiers had vanished? Since then we have had ample demonstration that there is room for new industry without displacing the old. Air lines, for example, have grown tremendously without putting the railroads out of business. Even more spectacular has been the way frozen foods have become popular without putting a single dent in our old standby, the tin can. This is brought out in a study just completed by American Can Company, which makes frozen food containers as well as cans. Production of six major vegetable crops (sweet corn, asparagus, spinach, lima beans, snap beans and green peas) for quick freezing has increased eight times, from slightly over one million cases in 1936 to more than 12,000,000 cases in 1945. Yet canners' gains in volume were almost five times greater. And at the end of the period canners enjoyed a considerably greater share of the total production for market than they did in 1936.

Oil Shears
Oiling is necessary for both seissors and shears, every six months or so. A drop of sewing machine oil on both sides of the screw holding the blades together is sufficient. The excess oil is wiped off after the blades are worked back and forth to work in the oil. Feissors should be kept dust free by wiping before and after using.
