CRUSADE COMMITTEE MEETS

The World Mission Crusade for Christ committee of the First Baptist church met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Martin, Monday evening, to discuss their goals for the next eighteen months. This crusade is a part of the \$125 million postwar program of the major evangelical churches in the U.S.A. Baptists have agreed to share \$14 million for relief, reconstruction, evangelism and missionary advance.

Mrs. A. C. Spriggs, co-chairman of the committee reported that \$930 has already been raised and under the leadership of Mrs. W. C. Martin, chairman, the committee suggested a goal of \$2500 for the local church. It was pointed out, that if each person took an equal share, it would amount to \$108. However, each gift was an individual matter between the giver and God. Each person is asked to give in response to the blessings he felt he had received from God. The church will vote Sunday to accept or reject this recommendation of the committee.

Additional members present were Mr. Ervin Hansen, Mr. A. C. Spriggs, and Mr. Peter J. Bakker. Refreshments of coffee, cocoa, and cookies were served.
