Annual Police
Report for 1946

A postwar crime increase of approximately 45 percent was shown Monday in the Cottage Grove police department's annual report for 1946, but city police kept pace with the situation by increasing the number of arrests and the number of cases cleared by arrests.

There were 345 criminal offenses as compared with 281 during 1945. But the city police arrested 304 persons during the year as compared with only 214 during the previous year.

Added enforcement and a larger police force have contributed to the larger number of arrests during the past year. The arrest of 129 persons on drunk and disorderly charges, as compared with last year's 64 arrested on the same charges helped to produce the big increase in the total of persons arrested.

Dairy Calf Sale
Planned for 4-Hers

To aid 4-H dairy club and FFA members in obtaining good dairy stock for their projects, a special sale of purebred Guernsey calves and yearling heifers will take place at the State Fair grounds in Salem March 29 exclusively for these two groups.

Plans for the sale were drawn up in Corvallis by a committee from the Oregon Guernsey Cattle club meeting with representatives of the O. S. C. extension service and the state department of vocational education.

Animals to be sold will be selected from the purebred Guernsey herds of the state by a committee of breeders, representatives of the American Guernsey Cattle club, and a representative of the extension service. It is expected that from 30 to 50 head will be chosen.

Chairman of the Guernsey club committee which proposed the establishment of the sale is L. E. Francis, Tillamook. Other committee members are R. M. Lyon, Junction City, club president; Gustave Selander, Corvallis; Curtis W. Hull, Hillsboro; Charles Evans, Salem; and Elmer Meadows and Ray West, Portland.

NAVY ANNOUNCES
MANY VACANCIES

L. J. Reinholdt, local recruiter for the navy in this area, said today that many vacancies now exist for young men in the United States Navy. He pointed out that the recent lifting of the quotas on enlistments made it easy for young men to select and follow the trade of their choice in the navy. A short time ago the navy was permitted only to enlist a small number of men each month, and the navy recruiter added, such conditions may return at anytime without further notice.

In pressing his point, the navy recruiter said it was better for those men who are interested in a tour of duty with the navy to obtain it while the vacancies exist. High school students who will graduate with the next class may make all necessary arrangements now to assure them a spot even if the quota system should again be put into effect.

sued, 14 drunken driving arrests, 1 hit and run, and 121 other car accidents with 4 injured.

In 1946 there was an increase in break and enter cases, 9 being reported, as against 3 in 1945. The police also investigated 15 cases involving prowlers, making 1 arrest. There were 101 other investigations for all other causes, including one suicide, 2 fatal car accidents and 1 death from natural causes.

Car thefts went from 5 stolen in 1945 to 14 cars and 2 trailers stolen, all of which were recovered.

The number of juveniles detained dropped from a total of 46 in 1945 to 30 in 1946, of which 21 were curfew citations with 7 of these released when they were found to have valid excuses. Police held 5 juveniles for their parents and 10 who had been reported missing were found.

Stolen bicycles totaled 24, of which 23 were recovered and 43 bicycles were found and restored to their owners.

Police found 77 doors had not been locked by owners, directed property owners to cut limbs and brush, found one amnesia case who was taken to Eugene. Assistance was given to 4 stranded people. 24 fires were patrolled. Thirty dogs were disposed of.

People committing crimes during the past year paid \$3,371.00 as compared with \$1,337.00 in 1945. Traffic violators paid a total of \$288.00 in 1945 while \$4,034.00 was collected in 1946. Revenues from Municipal Court in 1946 for both traffic and criminal offenses totaled \$7,406.00.

ARMY GIVES DETAILS
OF MANPOWER DRIVE

Specific examples of the type of jobs made available by the new Regular Army's intensified manpower drive announced last week, were listed today by Col. M. L. McCreary, chief of Sixth Army recruiting.

These run the gamut from air Traffic Service Technicians to Motorcyclists and include Rotary Wing Mechanics, Automotive Repairmen, Aerial Photographers, Munitions Workers, Radio Repairmen, Weather Observers, Supply Clerks, Cooks and Telegraph Operators.

In fact the Army has 40,000 good jobs a month for 40,000 volunteers a month.

These volunteers, Col. McCreary said, have an opportunity for training in scores of skills and trades in special service schools under the world's finest instructors. The new Regular Army, he pointed out, not only needs 40,000 men a month to maintain its authorized strength of 1,070,000 by July 1, of this year but it also needs quality. For a high degree of intelligence is necessary to absorb the training required to handle rockets and other scientific equipment of this atomic age.

The drive for manpower is being stepped up here, as well as throughout the nation, at a time service in the new Regular Army offers three basic essentials to any good job, Col. McCreary pointed out. He listed them as high pay, security and a chance for advancement.

RESEARCH IN TOOTH DECAY
STARTS ON 1000 STUDENTS

One thousand freshman students are cooperating at OSC in a research project in home economics to discover, if possible, the relationship between nutrition and tooth decay under Oregon conditions. This is the study financed for two years by the 1945 legislature at the request of the rural homemakers of the state represented by the Home Economics Extension council.

Though authorized two years ago, detailed work on the project was delayed until now by war-caused shortages in staff, equipment and supplies. Some equipment has now been obtained from army surplus, but much of it, including that for a dental chair and X-ray machine installed in the home economics building, was purchased.

Atlantic Basin
The Atlantic has four huge basins. These extensive low areas are separated by the mid-Atlantic rise, one of the longest mountain ranges in the world, but completely submerged except for the Azores and Ascension island. Modern knowledge of this ridge in the Atlantic helps keep alive the legend of the "lost Atlantis," which Plato described as a populous mid-Atlantic continent that sank beneath the waves 12,000 years ago. The ridge once may have been above water, but most geologists doubt that it sank within recorded time.
