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**Agriculture in State Analyzed By OSC Faculty**

Future improvement in Oregon agriculture will fall in three phases, in the opinion of a committee of the faculty of the school of agriculture at Oregon State college which has just published a comprehensive analysis of Oregon agriculture. These three categories are (1), the conservation of the soil and its productive capacity; (2), the adjustment of the production processes largely to distant markets; and (3), the development of social conditions in rural regions that will compare favorably with urban in attractiveness for both rural adults and young people.

The report has been published in the form of a 120-page bulletin entitled "Oregon Agriculture I, An Analysis." A number of other smaller bulletins in the same series have also been published recently on separate phases of Oregon agriculture such as dairying, poultry production and others, dealing with these in more detail.

The committee which developed the analysis is headed by F. L. Ballard, associate director of Extension service, and included the following others: P. M. Brandt, Paul Carpenter, Henry Hartman, D. D. Hill, E. L. Potter, F. E. Price and C. V. Ruzek of the resident staff, and W. C. Leth, Polk county agent.

This committee, as well as a group of sub-committees to deal with separate phases of the industry, was appointed in 1944 with a view to recommending policies for the guidance of the school of agriculture in its three major divisions which are resident teaching, research and extension.

The results of the studies made by these committees were 30 separate reports which were later briefed, summarized and drawn together in the single background statement which has now been published.

The bulletin is divided into seven sections starting with basic considerations and including rural socio-economic development, developments in early twentieth-century farming, horticulture, field crops and specialties, and conclusion.

"It is not the purpose of this report to go extensively into the field of recommendations," the authors state in conclusion. "Nevertheless, it should be cited here that the nearer the people of Oregon can come to the development of a sound program of agriculture and rural life that is understood and generally accepted by a substantial majority of the people, the greater will be the prosperity and general welfare of all the people of the State."

**40,000 Will Lose Social Security if Claims Not Filed**

Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene field office of the Social Security Administration said today that many survivors of some 40,000 deceased war veterans will lose benefits due them unless they file necessary claims by February 10th.

The families in question are those of veterans who died after discharge but before August 10,

1946. Such families who are not eligible for veterans compensation or pensions and who meet other requirements of the Social Security Act are entitled to insurance payments retroactive to the time of the veteran's death.

They still will be eligible for monthly payments after February 10, but the retroactive benefits will be lost if application has not been made by then.

Families of veterans dying within three years after discharge are entitled to special Social Security payments, in keeping with legislation passed by the last Congress. In the case of deaths occurring after August 9, 1946, the payments are retroactive to a

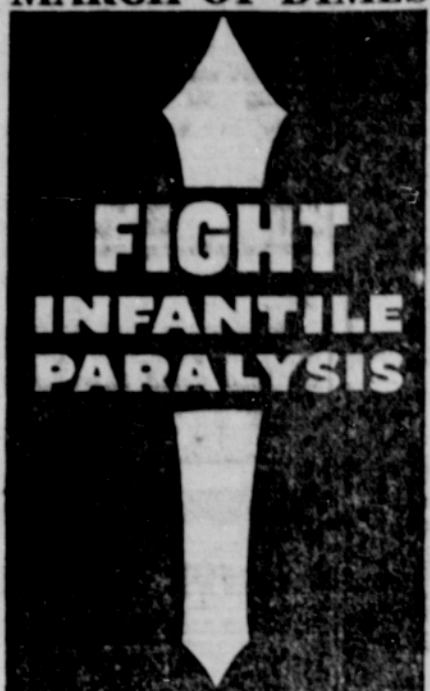
