New Chevrolet Passenger Cars Make Appearance

With virtually no interruption of production for the changeover, Chevrolet today introduced its new line of passenger cars, comprising 11 models in three series, all smartly styled in the modern mode.

The three series are the specially styled Fleetline, the de luxe Fleetmaster, and the economy-range Stylemaster. All show marked advances over previous models in exterior styling and trim, and in interior finish and fittings.

The historical shutdown for new model switch-over was by-passed in making the change at this time, according to T. H. Keating, general sales manager of Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors.

"Not only was the usual shutdown for retooling avoided," Mr. Keating said, "but there was virtually no decrease in the rate of output when these models went into production. On the day of the change-over, the first of the new models followed the last of the old on the assembly lines almost without a gap."

"Chevrolet thus was quite successful in its determined effort to bring out an improved line of motor cars without halting or seriously retarding production, in order that the great number of waiting purchasers—both those who have placed orders and those planning to do so—should encounter no additional delay."

"This factor in the automotive picture is one reason why changes have been confined largely to those improvements that could be made without causing the car-buying public to face further inconvenience and disappointment," Mr. Keating added.

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Safeway Stores To Start Employee Retirement Plan

Inauguration of a new retirement plan for employees of Safeway Stores, Incorporated has been announced in Portland by J. H. Branlund, division manager for the company, following a series of employee meetings at which the program has been explained to Safeway personnel by Frank A. Gealta, of the concern's executive staff in Oakland, California.

"Establishment of a workable retirement plan for Safeway employees has long been the aim of our Company," said Branlund. "Our objective has been to adopt a program which would provide a livable income and yet not overburden employees with their share of contribution."

After several years of study, a plan has been evolved which will insure a retirement income at the age of 65 which, plus Social Security benefits, will, in almost every case, either equal or exceed 50 per cent of the employee's average income over a 30-year period. The stockholders formally approved the retirement plan last month and it is now in effect.
