

## Demonstration of Pruning Filberts and Walnuts to Be Given Saturday

Two demonstrations on the pruning of filberts and walnuts will be conducted on Saturday of this week by the Lane County Horticultural Society cooperating with the county agent's office, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher. Methods of pruning will be demonstrated by C. O. Raw-

lings, extension horticulturist of the Oregon State College. The schedule is as follows: 10:00 a. m.—Farm of Frank Bartholomew, about three miles northeast of Springfield, Hayden Bridge road. Mr. Bartholomew is president of the Lane County Horticultural Society. 1:30 p. m.—Farm of G. B. Brown & Son, on Owosso Drive in the Santa Clara community. Owosso Drive leads to the east from the River Road directly opposite Kory Court.

A total of 153 attended the tree fruits pruning demonstrations conducted on January 28 by the Horticultural Society cooperating with the county agent's office and many of those present requested demonstrations on the pruning of filbert trees and walnut trees.

### SCHOOL DISTRICT MERGER LAW OF OREGON UPHOLD

SALEM — The State Supreme Court Tuesday upheld constitutionality of the law providing for merger and withdrawal of school districts.

The decision, by Justice Bailey, reversed Circuit Judge Peters of Yamhill County, who had held the law invalid. The court's decision grants permission to School District 94 of Yamhill County to merge with Dayton High School District No. 4. The opinion also grants District 94 permission to sever its connection with Amity High School District.

### HOUSE PLANNING BULLETIN READY

A bulletin published first in 1940 entitled "House Planning Ideas of Oregon Rural Women" has been reprinted by the O.S.C. extension station and is now available free from county extension offices. This bulletin, by Maud Wilson and Laura Wells, resulted from questioning 450 homemakers in all parts of the state.

### SALES TAX BILL INTRODUCED

A bill for a 3 per cent retail sales tax, containing a 40-mill property tax limit and exempting persons earning less than \$5000 a year from paying income taxes, was introduced in the State Legislature Wednesday by Rep. Earl Hill, Cushman, Lane County. The measure does not provide for the use of tax tokens, and does not contain a clause to refer it to the people.

### COTTAGE GROVE BOY ENLISTS IN THE NAVY

Roland F. Skoglie, who lives on Lorane Route in Cottage Grove has enlisted in the U. S. Navy for four years. Roland is now at San Diego, California where he will undergo 10 weeks of training. Upon completion of his training Roland will be given leave to come home before being assigned to one of the ships in the fleet.

### NEW EXAMINATION FOR NAVY CIVIL ENGINEER

A new examination will be held in May for civil engineers seeking appointment as junior grade lieutenants in the Navy Civil Engineer Corps, the Bureau of Yards and Docks has announced. The new examination was scheduled after the Bureau received indications that many applicants had failed to get adequate notice for the test to be given in February. A total of 70 billets are open. Candidates must be between 22 and 30 years old, must be graduates of an accredited engineering

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 4th (Special) James W. Aiken, the new athletic coach of the University of Oregon, has accepted an invitation to be on the roster of speakers of the 20th annual Dad's Day program, Cy Hawver, state secretary of the Oregon Dads, has announced.

Principle speaker for the luncheon, to be held in Straub hall on the university campus February 15, will be Dr. Paul C. Packer, chancellor of Oregon's state system of higher education.

### CHICK-REARING GUIDE READY

Poor equipment and poor management in brooding and rearing can ruin the best chicks ever hatched, say J. A. Harper, assistant professor of poultry husbandry, and N. L. Bennion, extension poultryman, in a revised O.S.C. extension bulletin, "Chick Brooding and Rearing." This bulletin, first issued in 1944 but revised and reprinted recently, constitutes an illustrated handbook on methods found best by the experiences of Oregon poultrymen. Copies are free at any county extension office.

### HUNTING LICENSES LAST YEAR BROUGHT RECORD SUM

A record 9,854,313 hunters paid out \$19,805,444 for licenses last fiscal year, the Fish and Wildlife Service said at Washington last week. The number of resident licenses, non-resident licenses and revenue collected, listed in that order, included: Oregon, 156,106 and 3,086 and \$528,688; Washington, 369,032 and 257 and \$667,162.

### 50,800 VISIT UMPQUA FOREST DURING 1946

There were 50,800 visitors on the Umpqua National Forest during 1946, M. M. Nelson, forest supervisor, reported this week. Of this number, 35,500 were campers, 4,500 were picnickers, and 5,570 persons were resort visitors. The number was an increase over the year before of approximately 35,000. The average visitor to the Umpqua forest stayed four days in 1946; 3 1/4 days in 1945. Last year saw the greatest number of visitors to the forest since 1941, when 90,500 persons came to camp, fish or hunt. Approximately 35,000 of last year's forest visitors were fishermen.

## 4-H Leaders Told Oregon Leads in Association Work

Oregon 4-H club local leaders associations are so much farther advanced than those in most states that the rest of the nation is looking to this state as a pattern in building their own local leader groups.

This is the report given to the thirteenth annual 4-H club leaders conference at Oregon State college by Mrs. Charles L. Edwards of Benton county who was one of two Oregon local leaders to be awarded free trips to the national club congress in Chicago last fall. Mrs. Edwards, interviewed leaders from other states at the congress to pick up new ideas for use in Oregon. She found that the Oregon State local leaders association is considered the outstanding one in the country.

This three-day western Oregon conference will be followed by one for eastern Oregon at Pendleton February 13, 14 and 15. The Corvallis meeting was attended by 165 local leaders from 20 western and central Oregon counties.

An evening banquet was addressed by E. H. Greenwood, secretary of the Oregon Bankers association, who said that while Oregon is sixth from the top nationally in percentage of eligible youth enrolled in club work, still

only one in five is a member here, leaving a wide field for future work.

Mrs. E. F. Wright, Portland, is president of the state association which directed portions of the program. Members of the O.S.C. staff conducted classes for leaders covering both objectives and methods in club work for 1947.

Leadership pins were presented at the banquet to the following: Ten year—Alice Lindsay, Wilderville, Josephine county; Mrs. Myrtle M. Schreiber, Molalla, Clackamas county; and Clayton Nyberg, Tualatin, Washington county. Nyberg was formerly a club member for 10 years.

### Carol Drake's Potato ways

**FROSTED STUFFED POTATOES**—Potatoes make a main dish and use left-overs when dressed up this way.  
Cut large baked potatoes in half lengthwise, or remove a slice from top. Remove centers; mash thoroughly; add seasonings and hot milk, beating until fluffy. Fill shells with creamed chicken, eggs or sea food, or little pig sausages or frankfurters. Bake potatoes on top. Brown in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 minutes. For attractive browning, brush with slightly beaten egg yolk or paprika before returning to oven.

**SHREDDED-FRIED POTATOES**—This quick addition to a hurry-up meal looks like a large crusty pancake.  
Heat a generous amount of shortening or drippings in a heavy frying pan; add coarsely shredded, peeled raw potatoes, allowing one potato for each person. Season to taste. Cook at medium heat until browned. Cut through the center and turn each half carefully to keep shape; brown on second side. Remove to hot plate and serve at once cut in pie-shaped wedges.

**CRUSTY FRENCH-FRIED POTATOES**—These take less shortening than most French fries.  
Slice 6 peeled potatoes into thin slices—they're easier to fry in shallow fat than are long strips. Put in very cold, salted water for few minutes, drain and dry thoroughly. Drop potato slices, a few at a time, into 2 inches of hot shortening; cook until done and browned, about 2 minutes. Drain on absorbent paper and sprinkle with salt. Place in single layer in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) to keep warm while remainder are being fried. Serves 6.
