Methods of Weed Control Talked at Meeting Feb. 18th

Up to date information on methods of controlling weeds will be discussed at a special weed control meeting to be held in the 4-H Club building on the county fair grounds in Eugene on Tuesday, February 18, starting promptly at 1:30 p. m., according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher. Discussion will be led by W. C. Nibler, assistant extension specialist in farm crops of the Oregon State College, who has been doing extensive work on weed control problems during the past year. The meeting has been arranged by the county agent in cooperation with the crop improvement committee of the Lane County Agricultural Council.

Among subjects that will be discussed are when and how to use 2, 4-D in weed control, spraying equipment and how 2, 4-D can be made to fit into a farm weed control program. There will also be discussion on the use of chlorates in weed control, prochlor, and clean cultivation.

The members of the farm crops committee state that this is an important meeting and they urge all farmers having weed control problems to attend.

Battered Lion Squad to End Season Soon

A battered, injury ridden Lion quintet approaches the end of the 1946-47 season with a scanty league win record of only two games, but a reputation for scrapping all the way whatever the odds. Northwest Turkey Growers Granted Support of 27 1/2 lb.

The Agriculture Department notified Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) Tuesday the Commodity Credit Corporation has approved a support price program for turkeys in the Pacific Northwest that will give the producers an average price of 27 1/2 cents a pound live weight.

Growers from Oregon, Washington and Northern California, the area in which the program will be instituted, asked for it on the grounds they were losing money on their flocks. They said they were averaging about 18 cents a pound live weight.

Cordon said the support prices will include turkeys held in storage by the growers and that these prices will be put into effect:

Young toms and young heavy hens over 18 pounds, 25 cents live weight, 32 1/2 cents dressed; young hens 16 pounds or less, 32 1/2 cents live weight, 41 1/2 cents dressed; old hens 16 pounds or less, 26 cents live weight, 34 cents dressed; old heavy hens, 24 cents live weight, 32 cents dressed, and old toms, 21 cents live weight and 29 cents dressed.

The government will buy enough turkeys to keep prices up to the establishing price.

SUPREME COURT OKAYS HATCH ACT
The Supreme Court Monday upheld the Hatch "clean politics" law ban on political activity by federal employees or by state employees whose jobs are financed from federal grants.

Two separate rulings were handed down. The section forbidding federal employees from taking active part in political campaigns was ruled valid in a decision turning down a challenge from the CIO United Public Workers of America.
