Cottage Grove Girl Scouts continue to grow in number and in interests. At present there are 82 girls registered in five troops. These troops meet regularly under various leaders and are carrying out their planned activities.

The newest Brownie troop with Mrs. O. J. Thiel and Mrs. George Johnson as leaders has arranged a Valentine party for this week's meeting. From their dues of two cents a week these 14 third grade Brownies are saving money to buy a scrapbook in which to record the troop activities. A number of the Brownies are learning to use a needle for the first time by making bean bags.

Mrs. Curtis Plunkett and Mrs. Jess Forester have sixteen Brownies registered in their fourth grade troop. This group has been meeting regularly since the first week of school. This month the Brownies have been busy making Valentines and observing other February special events.
