## Specialists Urge Number of Plans Controlling Weeds

Both chemical and cultural methods have their place in weed control, depending on the size of infestation and urgency of eradication, delegates to the recent Western State Weed Control conference in Portland decided. All agreed that farmer interest in weed control is at an all time high, and has come, fortunately, at the same time that spectacular new methods have been developed.

Research workers from nearly all states reported on 2,4-D results, showing many successful uses. They cautioned however, against considering it a panacea for all weed troubles. In this connection Dr. D. D. Hill, farm crops head at O. S. C., declared nothing yet takes the place of good farming.

Killing as many weeds by cultivation in advance of planting crops, and use of chemicals to eradicate small patches of perennial weeds as soon as they appear were other practices recommended.

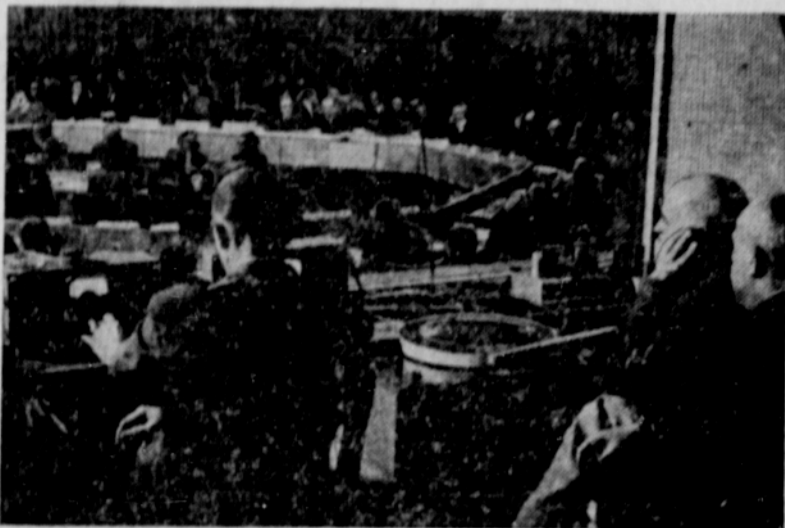

## Earthmoving Aid Available From PMA to Farmers

Conservation help will be furnished to Oregon farmers in connection with soil-saving practices involving earthmoving and construction work through a new feature of the 1947 agricultural conservation program.

Addition of the conservation services feature was announced by E. H. Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee, who said it will operate similar to the purchase order method of furnishing phosphate to farmers as conservation material.

A farmer who needs a conservation project such as an erosion control dam or a drainage ditch, Miller explained, will apply to the county committee for a purchase order. The county committee, after determining a "fair price" for the work, will issue a purchase order in the amount of the practice payment the farmer will earn for the completed job. The order will be turned over to a contractor with proper equipment who has agreed to do the job at the "fair price." On completion of the project, the county committee will pay the contractor the amount shown on the purchase order—usually about half the total cost, leaving the farmer to pay the remainder.

The PMA chairman pointed out that the plan will reduce the farmer's cash outlay, and also insure quality work, since the project must meet all practice specifications before the contractor can collect. He also sees the plan as an encouragement to contractors to engage in agricultural earthmoving work, since it will be possible to arrange for a full schedule of jobs to keep equipment busy on a year-around basis.

The use made of the conservation services feature in each county will be decided by the county committee, Miller said. He is hopeful that the plan will stimulate increased erosion control and conservation work calling for heavy equipment. The state's conservation needs for such practices, as shown by a recent survey, include drainage of 1,136,000 acres, land leveling on 664,000 acres now under irrigation, 12,000 erosion control dams, 35,000 stockwater dams and ponds, and 2,000 miles of diversion ditches.
