Savings Habit

A survey conducted by the Federal Reserve board indicates that the great majority of the American people still save their money on a hit-and-run basis. Only one in every four families plans its savings. About half the people spend first out of income and save what is left. One out of every four families doesn't save anything. There are many factors in saving, of course, varying from one person to the next, but one of the outstanding findings of this study is that people who have a regular savings plan save more than those with similar income who have no plan. For example, while 31 per cent of the people who set aside a certain part of their incomes regularly are in the class of large savers, only 22 per cent of those who spend first and save what is left are large savers.

Roman Punishment

Ancient Romans never sentenced criminals to prison terms. In those days prisoners were not used except for detaining accused persons until they could be tried or executed. The only recognized punishments were death and the infliction of bodily pain.

Hollow Pickles

Hollow pickles may result when the cucumbers are held longer than 24 hours before they are placed in brine. Faulty development of the cucumber may also be a contributing cause. Hollow pickles usually become floaters, making them easy to detect and eliminate from the pack.

Thick Egg Whites

In an egg of Grade A or AA quality, the white is thick and holds the yolk in place. As the quality deteriorates the white becomes thinner and allows the yolk to float. When such an egg is cooked on its side, the yolk rises to the upper side of the shell. That's one reason why poultrymen urge gathering of eggs three times a day. An egg, in a nest for four hours at 100 degree temperature and then not marketed for a week, may have a thin white by the time it is sold and used.

'Cold Storage' Eggs

The eggs of the great horned owl might well be termed the first "cold storage" eggs. These birds usually nest in mid-winter but successfully keep their eggs warm in sub-zero weather.
