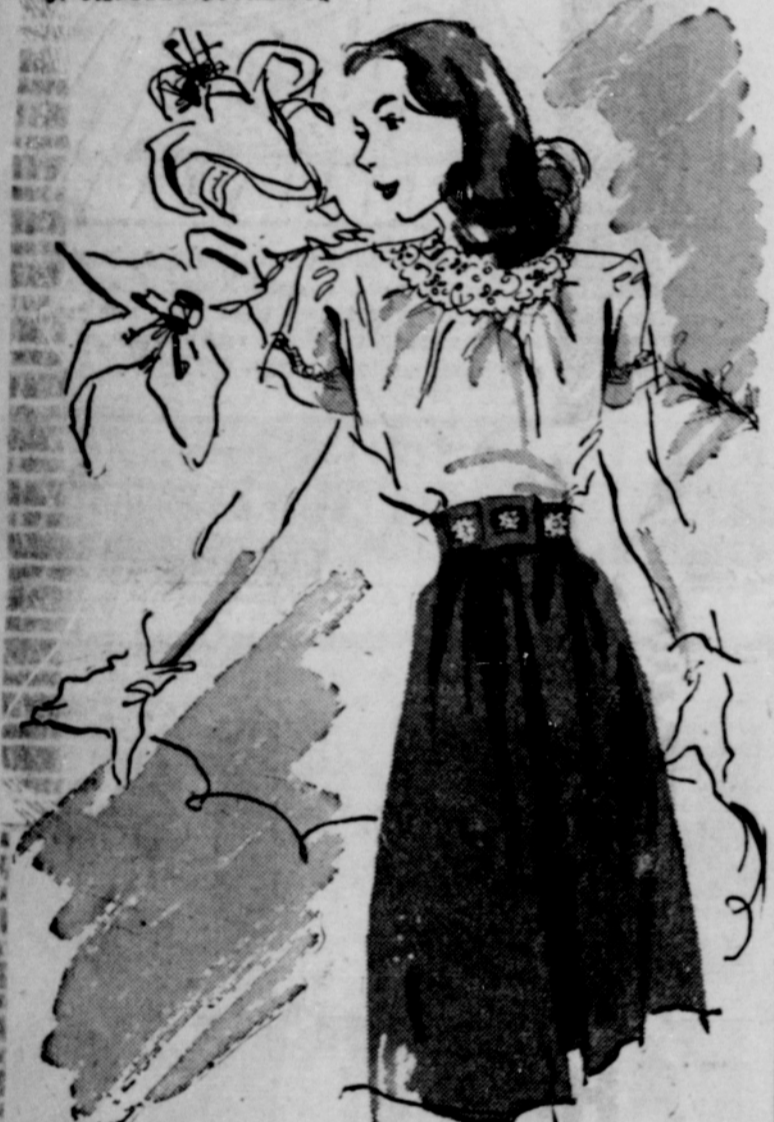

MUSICIANS WANTED FOR NAVY TRAINING

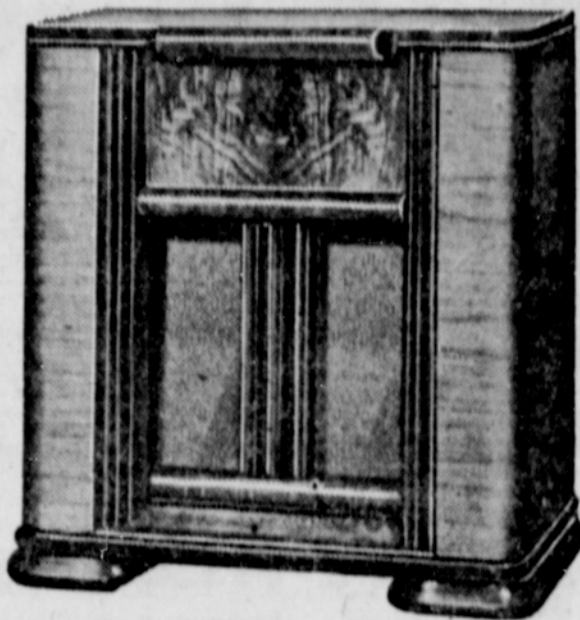

Those interested should inquire at the nearest Navy recruiting station for complete details. Those men who pass the preliminary examination will be sent to Washington D. C. at government expense and if they do not pass the final exam they will be sent home at no expense to them.
