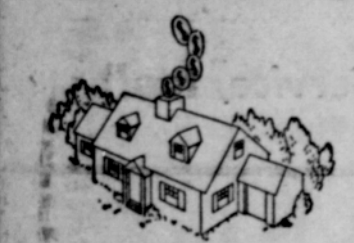
Cleaning Coat Collar

If the wool collar on a dark coat needs cleaning, lay the coat on a table with the inside open and flat. Then brush the collar to remove loose dust. After moistening a piece of dark wool cloth with cleaning fluid, sponge the soiled part with light brushing motions. Several light applications will do a better job than too much fluid used at once. Next, pat dry the material with a dry wool cloth and finally, brush the wool with a medium-soft brush.

Freshen Buttons

Tarnished gilt buttons and costume jewelry, as well as picture frames, may be freshened by using a small bottle of gilt paint and a small brush for applying. The color may be softened by mixing a little rouge with the paint in a saucer and blending well. Try out your color on another article until the shade is just what you want.

Hike Potato Sales By New Packaging Paper Bags Provide Ideal Retail Units

Millions of pounds of potatoes are getting a new ride to market this year.

They are riding in new paper bags, made of "wet strength" paper which

with consumer acceptance. absorbs moisture without breaking. They are going in 10, 15 and 50 pounds quantities which retail stores can sell immediately without further sorting, sacking or handling.

At one time, not so long ago, all grades, sizes and quantities, including culls, were shipped in burlap bags. Merchants had to sort and package the vegetables. Today an ever-growing number of shippers are pre-packaging potatoes in the new paper bags. This means a little more work, but it pays in providing a better-selected, higher quality and more uniform product. The store gets clean, graded potatoes packaged in retail-size bags which can be sold at once.

Wet strength paper was developed before the war but its merchandizing potentialities were not utilized until this year.

Rabbits Damage Trees

Rabbits frequently cause serious damage to the trunks of fruit and ornamental trees. This damage can be prevented by painting the trunks and lower scaffold branches with a resin-alcohol mixture. One hundred fifty to 200 two-year-old trees can be treated by dissolving seven pounds of resin in one gallon of ethyl alcohol. The pulverized resin is added to the alcohol and the mixture stirred occasionally over a period of 24 hours to dissolve the resin. Store the mixture in air tight containers.

KNOW YOUR BREED Cheviot By W. J. DRYDEN

Cheviot sheep are one of the oldest purebred varieties in the world. Prolific, hardy, with little oil in their



wool, they produce an exceptionally high class of fleece.

The mutton may be classed as among the very best. It contains about the right degree of fatness and is high in grain and flavor.

A beautiful breed, with fleece from 4 to 5 inches long in one year, and rams clipping between 8 and 10 pounds, it has proven its worth as a general purpose sheep. According to breed standards a mature ram in good flesh should weigh 185 pounds or more and a mature ewe, 140 pounds or more.
