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PLANNING WORK ABOUT FINISHED

The city planning commission has practically finished the work of zoning Cottage Grove, after more than a year's labor and hard labor at that. The task of the planning commission was another project that looked easy, but the more the proposition was analyzed the more complicated it became.

The matter of zoning does not attempt to regulate how buildings are to be constructed with reference to the type of materials used or the kind of plumbing or heating, but it does restrict certain districts to certain uses. If you have a \$10,000 residence and are in a zoned city, you should not have to worry about a packing plant, tan yard, or a red light district going in next to your house, which might ruin the value of your property. The chances are that your residence will be located in a district restricted to the residential type. If you are a merchant, there is a business district provided, if you have a factory to operate, there is an industrial district set aside.

THE VANISHING COUNTRY DOCTOR

The so-called country doctor, who has played an important part in the health of America for the past 100 years is gradually disappearing from the smaller communities over the United States according to current statistics and his disappearance has left most of rural America in a bad spot so far as health problems are concerned.

The last world war hastened his departure from the smaller towns. Many of the smaller town doctors enlisted in the service and on being discharged located in the larger centers. This left many sections of the nation almost isolated from medical aid, or at least from quick medical aid.

The principal reason assigned for the migration of the doctors from the smaller communities is that farm boys are not taking up medicine, or at least in the numbers of the city boys and when the city boys graduate from the medical school, they refuse to locate in the smaller places.

So it looks like the rural and small town people are going to be out of luck so far as medical attention is concerned unless they do one of two things: Either start growing their own doctors by encouraging farm boys to go to medical colleges or else do like the smaller places around Rochester, New York or Richmond, Virginia are doing. Establish a hospital unit in the smaller towns to operate in conjunction with the larger hospitals. This could be done in Cottage Grove, if there is no other way of getting a hospital here and the chances don't seem to be any brighter now than several months ago so far as we can see.

Either we will improve the health situation in the rural communities or we will face the prospects of socialized medicine and this won't be so good because we won't have any direct control over how the plan is operated. And if it turns out like most of the other federally operated enterprises, it will be pretty expensive on the taxpayers.

WHEREAS in Chapter XXV Oregon Code 1930 and amendments thereto, it is declared to be the duty of every person, firm, copartnership, company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock which is infested with ground squirrels and other noxious rodents or predators animals, or as soon as the presence of the same shall come to his, their or its knowledge, at once to proceed and to continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means; and

WHEREAS gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) are noxious rodents in Lane County, Oregon.

Now, therefore, all of such persons, firms, copartnerships, corporations and companies owning or having dominion over land in said Lane County, Oregon, are hereby required to take steps to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) within thirty days from the date of the first publication of this notice. If such steps are not taken, a person or persons appointed by the County Court of said Lane County will enter upon said lands and proceed to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) and the cost of said extermination will be levied against said lands.

The County Agricultural Agent hereby designates Monday, April 7, as a day to be known as "squirrel poisoning day" throughout the said Lane County, and it is hereby recommended that poisoned barley, as prepared by the undersigned and representatives of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, be used for the purpose of such extermination. Such poisoned barley may be secured from the undersigned at his office in Eugene, Lane County, Oregon, at approximately the cost of preparation.
