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BETTER UNDERSTANDING

Do we, as a people, understand how closely interwoven our economic life is with that of the world at large? William L. Hatt, who served almost seven years in Key Federal war posts, including a lend-lease assignment in Moscow, thinks that a wider public understanding of business news and trends is necessary for world peace and prosperity. The president of SKF Industries, Inc., even went further than that in a recent New York speech to say that an understanding of industrial news is now a prime duty of citizenship if we are to build a lasting prosperity and contribute to the improvement of world conditions. Toward this wider understanding, he suggests that some of the nation's great reporters and news analysts who devote themselves almost exclusively to political events, apply their extraordinary abilities to covering the news of industry. The great news outlets, he adds, could perform an invaluable service to the nation by explaining business and news trends so that every reader could grasp the close relationship of our economic well-being to political security at home and abroad. It might also help us better to understand some of the problems which have divided management and labor at home.

LET'S SUPPORT THE PAPER DRIVE

You may not believe it, but paper is the most critical item of today. Some kinds of paper can be bought in reasonable quantities, but items made of other kinds of paper are just not on the market.

From here it looks like many of the smaller newspapers over the nation are going to be badly hurt for want of print before newsprint becomes plentiful and right now there is little or no hope for improvement because there are no new mills being built and those in operation are running to capacity.

Up to now and including the war, we have had only one successful paper drive. One or two earlier drives shortly after the start of the war were premature and stacks of paper in the armory were lost. Without doubt much of the badly needed paper was wasted because the public grew tired of waiting for any effort to collect waste paper. Now you have the opportunity to place your waste paper to a good use as well as to aid the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Have your paper ready. Let's give the boys wholehearted support.

Sulfur Omitted From Cattle Grub Powder

Pyrophylite, Tripoli Earth or Frianite Used

Here's something new on an old farm subject—cattle grub control. For years the livestock specialists have been recommending a combination of sulfur and derris powder for dusting on the backs of grubby cattle. Some of them still are recommending this combination, which had its origin in the U. S. bureau of entomology.

What's new? Well, the bureau revised the formula during the war. Derris powder is still in the formula (it contains rotenone, the grub killing agent), but sulfur is out. Sulfur had no value as a grub killer.



Cattle grub will cause serious trouble if not properly controlled.

It served only as a diluent for derris, which contains the rotenone that does the job.

The bureau now recommends that the dust for grubs be made of one part derris (containing 5 per cent rotenone) and two parts of either tripoli earth, pyrophylite or frianite.

The reason sulfur was taken out is that the sulfur particles become electrified when applied to the animal's back. As a result, they stick to the hair instead of settling down to the skin and into the grub holes. The new materials designed for mixing with derris do not have this drawback.

NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER FOR SALE

Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 p.m. May 26, 1947, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 620 acres within Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 23 and 24, T. 21 S., R. 1 E., W.M., Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 30,000,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas fir, 500,000 feet B.M., more or less, of western red cedar and California incense-cedar, 2,000,000 feet B.M., more or less, of western hemlock, and an unestimated amount of western white pine, sugar pine, and other species of sawtimber. The appraised value of the timber according to long-term, normal market and operating conditions is \$5.00 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$4.40 per M feet for western redcedar and California incense-cedar, \$5.00 per M feet for western white pine and sugar pine and \$2.70 per M feet for western hemlock and other species. No bid will be considered which is less than these rates as a base rate applicable through the entire period of the sale agreement, plus at least \$4.00 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$1.40 per M feet for western redcedar and California incense-cedar, \$4.00 per M feet for western white pine and sugar pine, and \$1.00 per M feet for western hemlock and other species, the total to apply for all timber cut prior to September 1, 1948. On that date and at other times, as stated in the contract, total rates will be redetermined, but in no event will the redetermined stumpage rates be less than the basic appraised value as first above stated, and in no event will rates below those bid be established until at least 12,000,000 feet B.M. have been cut and paid for at not less than the bid rates. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$20 per M feet B.M., to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal and a cooperative deposit of \$10 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$20,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon. 37-2t-40

Conservation Brings Dividends to Farms

Control Blackhead by Use of Phenothiazine

The small roundworm, cecal worm, is not a serious parasite itself but is very important in the spread of blackhead. Control of the cecal worm tends to control blackhead. Control of the cecal worm is best done, according to Washington State college, by placing the young poult on a one-half per cent phenothiazine mash for five days when the young poult are first turned out on the open range.

Water Injures Leather

Water is hard on leather. Shoes should be protected from rain and snow by rubbers or overshoes. Wet leather gets out of shape and wears out more rapidly than dry leather. For this reason, wet shoes should be dried thoroughly before they are worn again. They should be put on shoe trees or stuffed with paper while drying so their shape won't be lost.

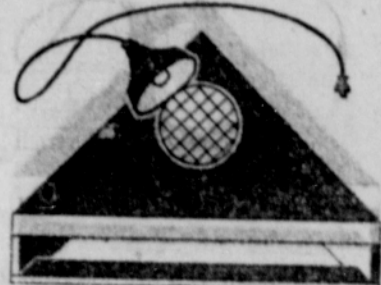


Electric Pig Brooder Saves Many Lives

Device Is Simple and Operation Cost Small

Little pigs, which grow up and go to market, aren't those which die or are crippled as a result of being chilled or crushed during farrowing.

To prevent these misfortunes and consequent loss in revenue, many farmers have investigated the use of electric pig brooders. Such brooders consist of a triangular wooden framework, the sides of which are about 3 1/2 feet long, nailed or bolted together at right angles, with the top of the hove constructed of lumber, insulating board or metal plate. A two by four inch board or metal guard across the front of the



framework will give the brooder additional strength and provide an opening approximately eight inches high through which pigs enter. Heat is provided by a 100 or 150 watt incandescent lamp per brooder, the size depending on the degree of warmth needed. These lamps are placed in a 14 or 16 inch dome type reflector, which is bolted securely on top of the hove, with the light directed through a hole about one inch smaller than the diameter of the reflector.

The brooder should be in place a day or two before farrowing time and the floor of the pen and hove covered with two or three inches of litter. Electricity consumed averages about 36 kilowatt hours per litter. Tests record that electric brooders reduce mortality of early spring pigs by 17.4 per cent.

Minerals for Hogs



Proper growth cannot be secured, nor will health be maintained among the hogs without ample supply of minerals. Bone meal, iodized salt (stabilized) and ground limestone should be kept before them at all times.

Hogs know how much salt they need and if given free access will not take more than the requires.

Two Are Added to Oregon Home Ec

Two additions to the central staff of the state 4-H club office at Oregon State college have been announced by F. L. Ballard, associate director of extension.

Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, home demonstration agent in Klamath county since 1938, will become assistant state 4-H club leader on May fifth, and will work with Miss Helen Cowgill in directing the projects for girls. Miss Cowgill has been assistant state leader for more than 30 years, making an outstanding record in this state.

Mrs. Gillen goes to her new position with a broad background of experience gained since she was graduated in home economics at Iowa State college. This includes high school teaching experience, work in menu planning in Chicago tea rooms, supervision of a home management house and her recent work as county home demonstration agent.

The new appointee is a widow with one daughter, 13, who is now in her fourth year of 4-H club work. Mrs. Gillen has been active in Klamath county club work, helping conduct shows, fairs, the club camps and in training local leaders.

\$100,000 in Foods Given Ore. Schools

Oregon school lunch programs have received foodstuffs valued at more than \$100,000 during the present school year, according to a report from the state PMA committee on the U.S. department of agriculture's direct distribution program.

Commodities distributed included potatoes, onions, canned fruits and jams, concentrated fruit juices, canned vegetables and cheese. Some of the commodities were acquired in supporting prices to producers, others were from army surplus stocks, and some were purchased with federal school lunch funds.

Both the direct distribution and the cash assistance program, handled by the state department of education, are authorized by congress for improving national health and developing wider markets for farm products by educating school children to higher standards of nutrition.

TONSILLECTOMY MAY LEAD TO POLIO

Tonsillectomies do seem to influence the incidence of poliomyelitis, and particularly of a specific, serious type, bulbar poliomyelitis, which involves vital centers of the nervous system. Investigators of the Toronto epidemic of 1937 found that acute poliomyelitis developed more frequently in children who had recently had their tonsils removed than in others. Considering all children with poliomyelitis in that epidemic, twice as many cases of the bulbar type developed among those who had previously had their tonsils removed as in those who had not. This last observation was borne out in the Detroit epidemic of 1939 when it was discovered that there was a higher percentage of infantile paralysis in patients who had had tonsillectomies at some previous time than among control cases in the same area. There, too, the bulbar type predominated.

Thus, into the common picture of summer tonsillectomies for children of school age has crept the dreaded poliomyelitis. Distortion is easy; keeping to facts is best. It would seem advisable to have the operation during a time of year when the incidence of poliomyelitis is not at its height. The virus of the disease is widespread but tonsillectomy in a community already infected does not necessarily mean the disease will follow. The determining factor is whether the virus exists in the operated throat. Then tonsillectomy may transform the mild infection, frequently free of symptoms, into the serious form of the disease.—From Parents Magazine.

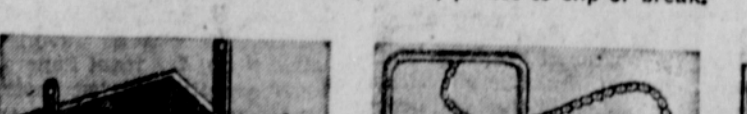
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
