NEW FOREST RANGER HAS BROAD EXPERIENCE

Albert Davies, who has recently been appointed to replace Ranger Wakefield in charge of the Bohemia Ranger District at Disston, will take over his new assignment on June 1. Ranger Davies is being transferred to the Umpqua National Forest from the Willamette National Forest, where he has been in charge of timber sale work in the Detroit area since returning from the Army in April 1946.

Ranger Davies has had wide experience throughout the Northwest in forestry work. He graduated from Parkdale High School and received his forestry training in Oregon State College, School of Forestry, graduating in 1936. Prior to graduation, Davies served in various capacities with the Mt. Hood Forest. He has been truck driver, lookout, fireman, and CCC foreman. In 1935 he was in charge of camp grounds along the Rogue River in the vicinity of Union creek. His timber sale experience started as scaler on the Mt. Hood forest and progressed thru various types of timber sale work on the Snoqualmie, Olympic and Willamette National Forests. In 1938 and 1939 he was assigned special fire work on the Mt. Hood National Forest, where he made fuel type maps and did other fire planning work.

Ranger Davies served as a captain in the army during World War II, serving from 1942 to March, 1946. He saw action in both France and Germany. Ranger Wakefield, who has been in charge of the Bohemia for the past three years, has been advanced to a staff position in charge of timber sales on the Willamette National Forest.
