Crop Insurance In State Doomed If Bill Passes

The federal crop insurance program in Oregon, which has accumulated substantial reserves during the past several years of large wheat crops, will be terminated or greatly curtailed if legislation now pending in congress is passed, Oregon farm organization leaders have been informed.

Passage of a bill to amend the federal crop insurance act, reported by the House Agriculture committee, would cancel most, if not all, of the contracts now in effect on 3,800 Oregon farms. E. H. Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee, has written to officers of the Oregon State Grange, Oregon Farm bureau, and Eastern Oregon Wheat league, in response to requests for information on the effect of the bill.

The pending bill limits wheat insurance to 50 counties, so that Oregon, which has about 1 1/2 per cent of the national wheat acreage, probably would be limited to not more than one county, the three farm leaders were advised. In that event, three-year contracts now in effect in 20 counties would be cancelled in all but one county at the end of 1947.

Miller's report disclosed that the program in Oregon is now in a sound position, with substantial reserves to meet losses resulting from drought, frost and a cricket damage to wheat in some parts of the state this year.

The premium reserves now amount to about 400,000 bushels, accumulated in nine counties. Many growers have built up individual reserves that would qualify them for reduced premium rates as preferred risks.

Long-term contracts and rate reduction plans have been offered to growers under the existing federal crop insurance act, which provides for an insurance program until 1950.

GIVE ARMY CORRECT ADDRESSES NEXT OF KIN ASKED

The War Department asks all survivors of men and women who died while serving in the Army to make certain that two Army agencies have their present addresses.

Many instances have been found where addresses of next of kin in the files of the Casualty Section, Adjutant General's Office, and Memorial Division, Office of the Quartermaster General, are incorrect. Letters sent to these next of kin by the two offices have been returned, marked "Moved; Left No Forwarding Address."

Next of kin who have moved since last notifying these offices of their addresses are asked to mail a post card or letter to each office, stating in effect:

"I am next of kin to (name) (grade) (serial Number). My former address was (street, city, state). My present address is (street, city, state)."

Curing Pork

In using the dry method of curing pork and under ideal conditions, two days per pound is the standard curing time. Under farm conditions, however, it is advisable to allow three days per pound for curing. A 10-pound ham will cure in 30 days, while sides or bacon will cure in from 10 days to two weeks. At the end of the curing period, scrub off the salt with warm water, let the meat dry, and smoke it.

Lime Lawn

If no lime was applied on the home lawn last year, put some on before the ground thaws in the spring. Use about 50 pounds of ground limestone per 1,000 square feet of lawn.

Scientific Driver Training in Sixty Ore. High Schools

Scientific driver training has been assured in almost 60 Oregon high schools for next fall, it has been announced by Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state.

"The general public is just beginning to understand that lasting safety on the highways depends on the Three E's—Engineering, Education, and Enforcement," Farrell said. "Over the whole country education has been the most neglected of these three."

Oregon is one of the leading states in encouraging formal training for drivers at the age when the greatest number normally begin to drive. The driving course was offered to the high schools of the state shortly before the first of the year. Almost immediately 50 schools began to lay plans to use it.

Tried elsewhere, a similar course was shown to reduce accidents among its graduates by one half.

The Oregon course begins with theory units and works up through actual behind-the-wheel instruction. Authors of the course have stressed the importance of the theory work, pointing to past failure of behind-the-wheel training to reduce accidents. They say that building a sense of responsibility and pride comes first in cutting accidents and violations.

Dimming Headlights Encouraged

Dimming headlights when following close behind another car is being encouraged by Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state. "The simple courtesy of dimming or lowering your lights will certainly save tempers and may easily save a serious accident," he said.

Oregon law specifically requires drivers to dim for oncoming cars. The custom of dimming for drivers ahead is universally recognized as a courteous and safe practice. The hazard of blinding glare in the rear-view mirror has given rise to sentiment for enactment of law covering the matter.

It was pointed out that, with accidents of nearly every type on the increase, every measure must be taken to stem the rising tide of highway destruction.

DEPOE BAY PLANS BIG MEMORIAL SERVICE

With 75 boats taking part in a parade to sea, 12 army planes flying overhead, a squad of navy men standing at attention and a marine color guard, the Fleet of Flowers, Depoe Bay's Memorial service honoring men who have died at sea promises to be the biggest service of its kind in Oregon.

The program opens at 10:00 a. m. Memorial Day, May 30th, with organ music and the loading of the 75 boats, which will take part in the parade. The National Anthem will follow the salutation to the flag. Short talks and prayers will be given by chaplains of several faiths who will talk in memorial to sailors, both service men and fishermen, who have lost their lives at sea. Following this taps will be sounded while the flag is lowered and with planes flying overhead the boats will put out in the channel. Rich Wisner of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and Bill Woods are members of the program committee.

Complimentary rides are being given to two members of each family who wish to place flowers—garden variety or wreaths—on the sea.

Last year many wreaths were received from all over the United States and this year many more are expected. Wreaths from far away will be put on the flag ship—"The Kingfisher", and dropped overboard by honored guests.
