Family Gets Its Milk Quota In This Main Dish, Dessert

DO you see that every member of the family, and not just the children, get their quota of milk every day?

At the present price of milk it is quite an item in the food budget, but money spent for milk is well spent. We all—old, young and middle-aged—need milk for its calcium and phosphorus content. Some of the milk may be supplied in cream soups, milk puddings or cream casseroles, instead of drinking it, as some people do not like plain milk.

In today's menu the creamed tuna and milk and cream in the dessert take care of the milk needs.

Today's Menu

Creamed Tuna Fish or Salmon in Patty Shells

French Fried Potatoes

Buttered New Cabbage

Cauliflower and Carrot Salad

Peach Custard Pie

Tea

Patty Shells—Puff Paste

1 c. butter or 1 1/2 c. bread margarine

1/2 c. ice water

Wash butter or margarine, reserve 1 tbs. and shape remainder into an oblong piece 1/4 inch thick.

Put on floured board or cloth. Work the reserved tablespoon butter into flour with fingertips of right hand, 2 knives or pastry mixer.

Moisten to a dough with ice water, turn on slightly floured board, and knead 5 min. Cover with cloth and bowl and let stand 5 min. Pat, lift and roll 1/4 inch thick, keeping paste longer than it is wide, and corners square. Draw into shape with fingers, if necessary.

Place butter in center of one side of paste; fold other side of paste over butter and press edges firmly to enclose as much air as possible. Fold one end of paste over enclosed butter, other end underneath.

Turn paste 1/4 way round, pat, lift and roll 1/4 inch thick, having paste longer than wide, lifting often to prevent sticking, and dredging board slightly with flour, when necessary. Fold from end to

wards center, making 3 layers. Repeat 4 times, turning paste 1/4 way round each time before rolling. After fourth rolling, fold from ends to center, then fold double, making 4 layers. Chill.

For patty shells, roll 1/4 inch thick, cut out rounds with cutter dipped in hot water. Remove centers from half the rounds with smaller cutter to make rims. Moisten edges of plain rounds with cold water, put on rims, press edges together slightly, and chill until paste is stiff.

Start baking in hot oven (450 P.), reducing heat gradually as they bake to 350 F., turning as needed to brown evenly. They should finish baking in 25 min. Lay trimmings carefully on top of each other, pat and roll out for small pastries. You can also use a rich pie crust recipe for patties, instead of this puff paste.

Peach Custard Pie

1 No. 2 1/2 can 1 tbs. butter or

peaches margarine

1/2 c. white corn 1/4 tsp. almond

syrup extract

Milk 1 tsp. lemon

1/2 tsp. salt juice

3 tbs. cream 1 c. whipping

corn starch cream

2 eggs, separated 1/2-inch baked

Drain juice thoroughly from peaches. Measure juice and add to custard. Combine

syrup, salt and corn starch in saucepan, add peach juice and milk and stir until smooth.

Heat to boiling over direct heat, stirring constantly. Boil gently for 1 1/2 min. or until mixture thickens.

Beat egg yolks and gradually add the hot mixture, stirring thoroughly. Return to saucepan and continue to cook for 3 min.

Remove from heat, add butter, almond extract and lemon juice and stir well. Gently fold the hot mixture into stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour a small portion in bottom of pie shell, place peach slices over this, then remaining custard filling. Chill, and serve topped with whipped cream. Serves 8.

FARM FORESTRY, CUTOVER LANDS DISCUSSED BY OSC

The place of farm forestry and cutover land in the Oregon agricultural industry is the subject of the sixth in a series of separate reports on Oregon agriculture to be published by the division of agriculture at Oregon State College. It is one part of a general study of postwar agriculture in Oregon made by a committee of the instructional faculty, experiment station and extension service staffs.

Farm woodlands comprise one ninth of the state's forest area and more than 19 per cent of the farm acreage, the bulletin points out. In the past relatively little attention had been given to cropping this farm timber as a source of steady income.

In western Oregon alone there are now more than two million acres of recent cutover and non-restocked deforested areas on which taxes are not paid, the report adds. While it is believed that only 10 to 20 per cent of such lands are adapted to grazing, the utilization of that much with better forage plants established would affect the income of certain counties materially.

While per-acre costs for converting cutover lands into grazing are not high, the investment in a total ranch unit makes a considerable sum. Thus it requires considerable capital first to purchase then improve and later operate these lands in an efficient manner, the report adds. Considerable experimental work has been done as a guide to such development.

Shun State Asylums

Eighty-five per cent of the nation's hospitalized mental patients are in state-supported institutions. Yet few psychiatrists—and there are only 4,000 out of a total 188,000 U. S. doctors—prefer to work in state institutions. The National Committee for Mental Hygiene reports that of 900 psychiatrists interviewed last year on their return from the armed forces, only 60 chose to take jobs in state hospitals.

The diamond can survive the atom bomb, according to tests made at Bikini for the American Museum of Natural History.

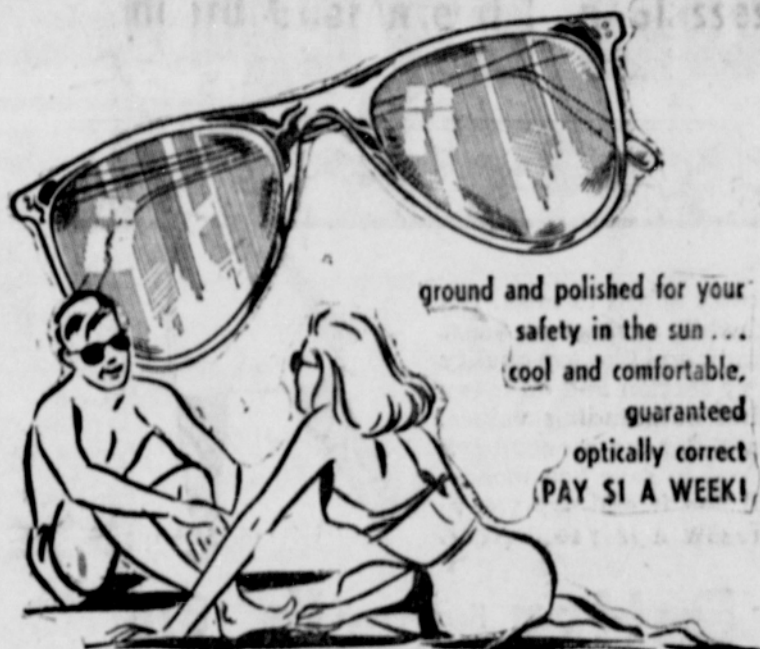


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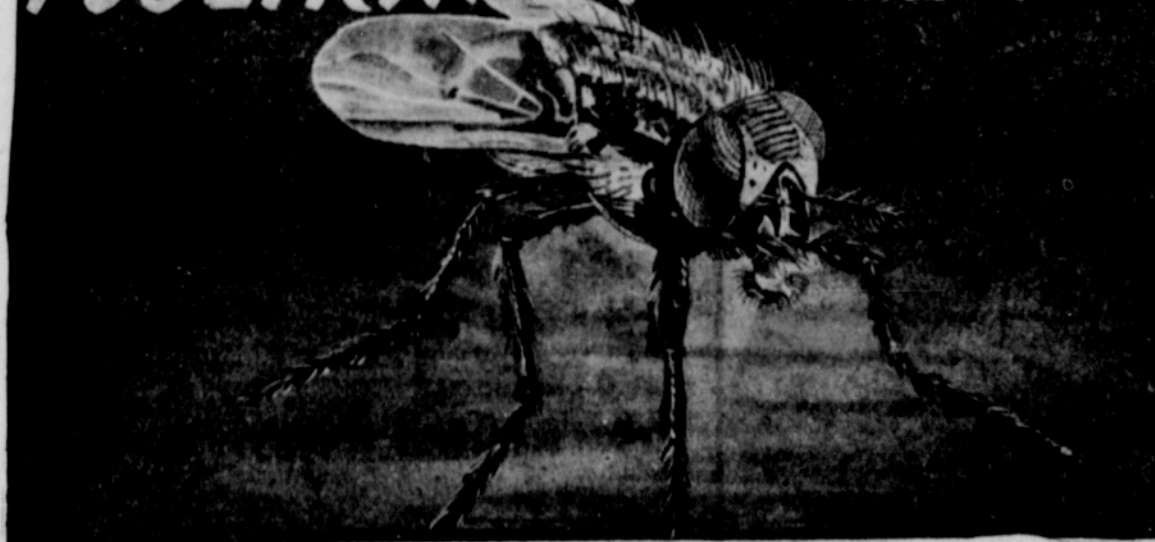
