Early Residents Observe Golden Wedding Sunday

About 90 relatives and friends called Sunday afternoon June 8th on Mr. and Mrs. Ernest McReynolds at their home five miles south of town, as they held open house in observance of their golden wedding anniversary. Many who could not go to extend congratulations and felicitations, sent cards, among them was Miss Anna Whiteaker of Eugene, daughter of the first governor of Oregon and a teacher of Mr. McReynolds in 1888 at the Latham school.

Mr. McReynolds came to Divide when nine years old and has lived there ever since. The couple met at the Hebron church over 50 years ago and were married in the same church in 1897, the site now being under water at the Cottage Grove lake.

Mr. McReynolds came to Cottage Grove by various modes of travel, coming from Kansas to California by train and from San Francisco to Portland by boat and on to Cottage Grove by wagon train. Mrs. McReynolds, who was Ida Powell, is the daughter of parents who crossed the plains in the early 50's.

They have four children, all of whom were present for their golden wedding: Kenneth and Geo. McReynolds, both of Cottage Grove; Katherine Knight and Austin McReynolds, both of Eugene and eight grandchildren, who were also present. Also attending the anniversary who were at their wedding June 6, 1897, were Mrs. McReynolds' sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. John Overholser, and three of her brothers, Ed Powell of Myrtle Point; Jim Powell of Drain and George Powell of Eugene.

A large decorated three-tiered wedding cake topped with a golden bell centered the refreshment table and yellow rosebuds completed the adornment.
