Summer School Planned Crater Lake, Oregon

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Planned as a service to teachers and others who work with groups of young people and with other groups in nature study programs is the Crater Lake Field School. Under joint auspices of the United States National Park Service and the University of Oregon the school will open July 14 and carry through for a five weeks period until August 16.

The school, an experimental project in nature appreciation, will offer opportunity for study and college credit in the field. Anyone who has a strong personal interest in nature study and in the appreciation of nature will find this course of study planned to his benefit.

Mr. and Mrs. George Cavey are driving a new pickup.

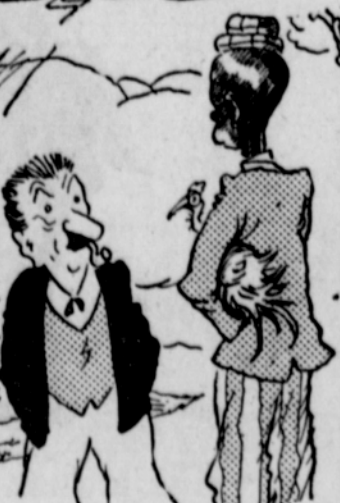
Little Gary Thompson is again on the sick list.

Timber Carnival At Albany to Attract Many

Albany, Oregon — Contests for loggers and others connected with the logging industry will be the principal item of fun, but everybody attending will share in it alike at the Albany Timber Carnival, July 2, 3, and 4.

Logging men from throughout the northwest are expected to enter in such competition as log chopping, jousting, topping and high climbing, bucking, and log rolling.

Additional events for the men from the woods and on the river will be a tug-boat race on the Willamette river, a parade of logging trucks with their logs, and a tree falling exhibition. Prizes for the different contests will exceed \$1,500.

A queen's coronation on the evening of July 2 at Waverly lake will open the festivities. This proved to be a magnificent show at last year's carnival and will draw huge crowds. Queen candidates are already being selected in various towns and cities.

Other timber carnival events will include a huge parade, vaude-

ville shows, ball games, carnival, horse show, old-time and modern dances, and a tremendous fireworks display.

Once again the citizens of Albany attired in their colorful outfits, hang out the "Welcome" sign to all.

RING OF PLENTY
3 cups cooked macaroni (1/2 lb. uncooked, broken in 1-inch pieces)
2 cups diced yellow American cheese (1/4-inch cubes)
2 cups soft bread crumbs
2 tbs. parsley, minced
2 tsp. salt
3 pods pimiento, minced (1 small can)
6 tbs. butter
2 tbs. onion, minced
2 cups milk, scalded
2 eggs, well beaten
1/4 tsp. pepper

METHOD
1. Cook macaroni until tender (about 15 minutes) in 3 quarts boiling water to which 1 tbs. salt has been added. Drain.
2. Combine with all other ingredients.
3. Pour into buttered ring mold, and set mold in pan of hot water (having water reach about 1 inch up on mold).
4. Bake.
5. Unmold, and fill center with creamed fish, meat or vegetables.
6. Serve hot.
TIME—Bake 35 minutes.
TEMPERATURE—350° F., moderate oven.
AMOUNT—10-inch ring mold.
