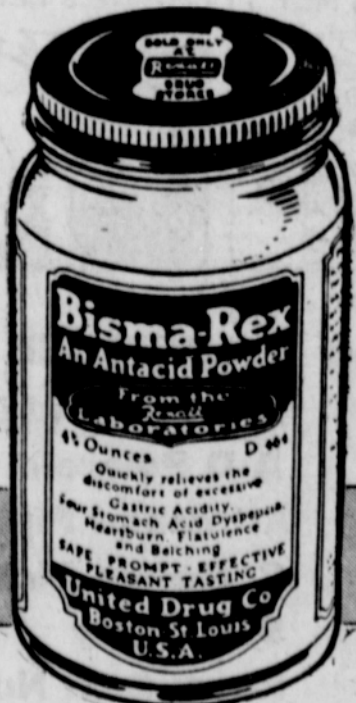

Not Too Late to Plant Vegetables

There is still time to plant some valuable vegetables on vacant garden land. This timely reminder comes from assistant county agent W. E. Parker, who lists the following crops as suggestions:

Tomatoes, peppers, celery, cauliflower, cabbage, brussels sprouts, Scotch curled kale, sweet corn, bush beans, carrots, beets, and winter squash.

Parker advises gardeners to watch out for insect pests and keep the duster handy. Insects can do a great deal of damage in a few days, so prompt control often means the difference between success and failure.

He also advises keeping a close check on moisture. It doesn't take as much water, and crops are not retarded by a lack of moisture if ground is never allowed to become dry.

Don't overdo the cultivation is another garden tip. Cultivate only enough to keep down the weeds and possibly a very light stirring of the surface as soon as the soil is dry enough after watering.

This is a good time to thin the early root crops—removing the ones that have reached usable size and thus making room for the smaller ones. Remove the tops as soon as the vegetables are pulled. This is necessary to avoid a loss of food value from the roots. The tops continue to grow after the vegetables are pulled, and if not cut off they will draw from the roots.

OAKLAND VOTERS APPROVE 'EXCESS' CITY BUDGET

In a city budget election at Oakland June 11th, voters approved a total city budget of \$21,066,80, which was \$9,516.80 above the 6 percent limitation. Increased expenditures during the coming fiscal year are due to a street and sidewalk improvement program, according to members of the budget committee. Approximately 80 votes in all were cast.

807 Graduated at OSC June 8th

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Every county in Oregon except Wheeler and Curry, 20 other states, one territory and five foreign countries were represented among the 807 graduates at the 78th annual commencement here June 8. After Multnomah and Benton counties, those with the most graduates were Clackamas and Linn, 25 each; Washington and Lane 22 each; Marion, 21; Jackson, 19; Yamhill, 17; Umatilla and Lake 12 each; Deschutes, 11; and Clatsop and Columbia, 10 each.

Of the total, 137 are from other states, one is from Hawaii and 11 from the countries of Canada, China, Egypt, India and the Federated Malay States. Slightly more than a fourth of the class, or 225, transferred to Oregon State from 95 different institutions in 25 states, one territory and one foreign country.

Eleven doctors' degrees, 65 masters' and professional degrees, and 731 bachelors' degrees were conferred. The average age of men was 26 and of women 23. Oldest and youngest members of the class were Fred G. Kachelhoffer and Walter M. Bollen, both of Cor-

vallis, who finished in engineering at ages of 54 and 20 respectively.

Oregon Auto Sales Show Big Gain

PORTLAND—Automobile sales in Oregon vaulted 174 per cent in the first four months of this year, compared with the same period in 1946, the Department of Commerce reported today.

This works out at \$274 for every dollar spent on automobiles in 1946, the department said.

Filling station sales also were up 15 per cent for the period. Washington and California sales lagged behind the Oregon pace, although Washington had a gain of 100 per cent and California 107 per cent on auto sales.

The report also listed a gain of 29 per cent for all kinds of business in the state for the first four months, compared with 19 per cent in Washington and 20 per cent in California.

The gain in various categories for Oregon: food, 11 per cent; dairy products, 30; bakery products, 15; dry goods, 31; furniture, household goods and radios, 27; appliances, 84; hardware, 30; lumber and building material, 30.
