WE MIGHT AS WELL FACE IT
Oregon voters will have the opportunity to approve or reject the sales tax issue this fall for the 5th or 6th time. According to the figures available, the state will have a three and a half million deficit at the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1949. The estimates are based on the assumption that the revenue source will not increase or the budgeted demands increase. The question for the voter to decide is whether or not the sales tax supplies the best method of wiping out the deficit and conducting the affairs of the state government. Rising costs naturally have affected every department of the city, county and state government including the school system, which requires the bulk of the revenue. Most every city and town we know of as well as nearly every school district has had to increase the budget over the 6 per cent limitation and in all but a few isolated instances the voters have been sympathetic enough with the positions of the schools and cities and towns to approve increased levy.

So far as we can see we have exhausted every potential source of taxable revenue and if increased revenue is demanded, the burden of supplying this revenue will fall on the home owner and the owner of real estate. It seems to us that the limit has been practically reached on real estate taxes and if these taxes go any higher, we will certainly be discouraging any further attempt at home ownership.

Opponents of the sales tax system have never told the public so far as we know of a feasible taxable revenue outside of the sales tax and until this is done we are afraid such opposition will not carry much weight.

Admittedly the sales tax system is a nuisance to all concerned, but it is a matter of choosing the lesser of two evils. It is both a nuisance to the purchaser who buys his supplies in the average Oregon town and to the merchant who must report his sales and do a lot of bookkeeping as well as to many needy, who can ill afford the cost of the tax. But the sales tax is one system where everyone pays a tax and it's the best revenue producer yet found by some thirty or thirty-five of the forty-eight states.

HENRY POLITICAL PROBLEM CHILD
All the fuss about stopping Henry Wallace from talking because he is an alleged communist is making Wallace a good drawing card as a speaker. Because he is the center of a controversy, lots of people go to hear him as a matter of curiosity and to hear what he is going to say.

Wallace is also popular with many university students, now numbering over 2,000,000, who are taking an unbiased interest in national affairs. The young voters together with the regular followers of Wallace make him a political factor to be reckoned with. No one can tell what his activities will amount to, but he can create enough political sympathy that the two principal parties can not overlook the possibilities. One political observer says he can not be elected president, but he can keep on having meetings denouncing what he thinks is wrong.

COLD FEET
Few of us realize the importance of the circulation. Not a single cell tissue or organ can survive for long without an adequate blood supply.

One of our most common complaints has to do with cold feet. Frequently, the reason is insufficient protection. Thin hose and low shoes cannot retain heat. Now, the fact of the matter is that the pedal extremities are much further from the heart than are the hands. Nevertheless, we slip on warm gloves for journeys out of doors, expecting the lower limbs to look out for themselves. All of which means that a goodly amount of the heart's energy goes to furnish blood to distant parts which promptly return it thoroughly chilled. If one is sitting or standing without moving, a sense of "shiveriness" may come on rapidly. On the other hand, exercise will keep the return flow on the move, allowing an increased arterial supply to bring warmth.

Old Oregon Electric Coaches Found On Motorlog Into Cariboo Country

I AM WRITING this on a sheet of yellow foolscap in a train berth. I am sitting up with the pad on my knees. When I flip out the little light in its cupped niche, I can look down on a dark and forbidding chasm. Below us the Cheakamus river thunders noisily to the sea. Its succession of falls, peeling like an organ, subdue the puffing of our locomotive as it struggles with the 2.2 grade.

These are solitudes one would expect to breach only on foot, or perhaps by horseback. This is the granite backbone of British Columbia, that vast and fabulous domain which stretches from the sub-Arctic to Puget Sound, from the Pacific ocean to the rim of the Canadian Rockies.

Into this granite labyrinth, where a cavalry regiment or wayfarer feels remote and distant from the magnificent scenery along the line. This can never be said of the North Country Limited. In Cheakamus canyon the train is so close to the roaring river, with its terrace of falls, that spray dampens the brick-red cars. The rails are thrust across the brink of Brandywine falls, and passengers in the old Oregon Electric coaches may lean from the windows and peer over the threshold and down into the pool 220 feet below.

Name Misspelled
One inevitable question always pursues every returned traveler from the Cariboo: "Why is it 'Cariboo' instead of 'Caribou' like the dictionary says it ought to be?"

Well, it refers to the same thing—namely, the big ungainly animal with sweeping antlers which has flesh that makes very good steaks and stews. But long ago an explorer without a dictionary called it "Cariboo" and that's the way the region has been known ever since.

However, folks up along the Pacific Great Eastern know the correct spelling in "caribou," and that is the way they write it on the menu cards in the little restaurants where for 75 cents, you can eat a caribou cutlet dinner complete from soup to custard pie.

Auto Left Behind
Vancouver, of course, may be reached by automobile, rail or bus from Portland. It is an easy dawn-to-dusk drive, as we found in the AAA white motorlog car of the Oregon State Motor association. 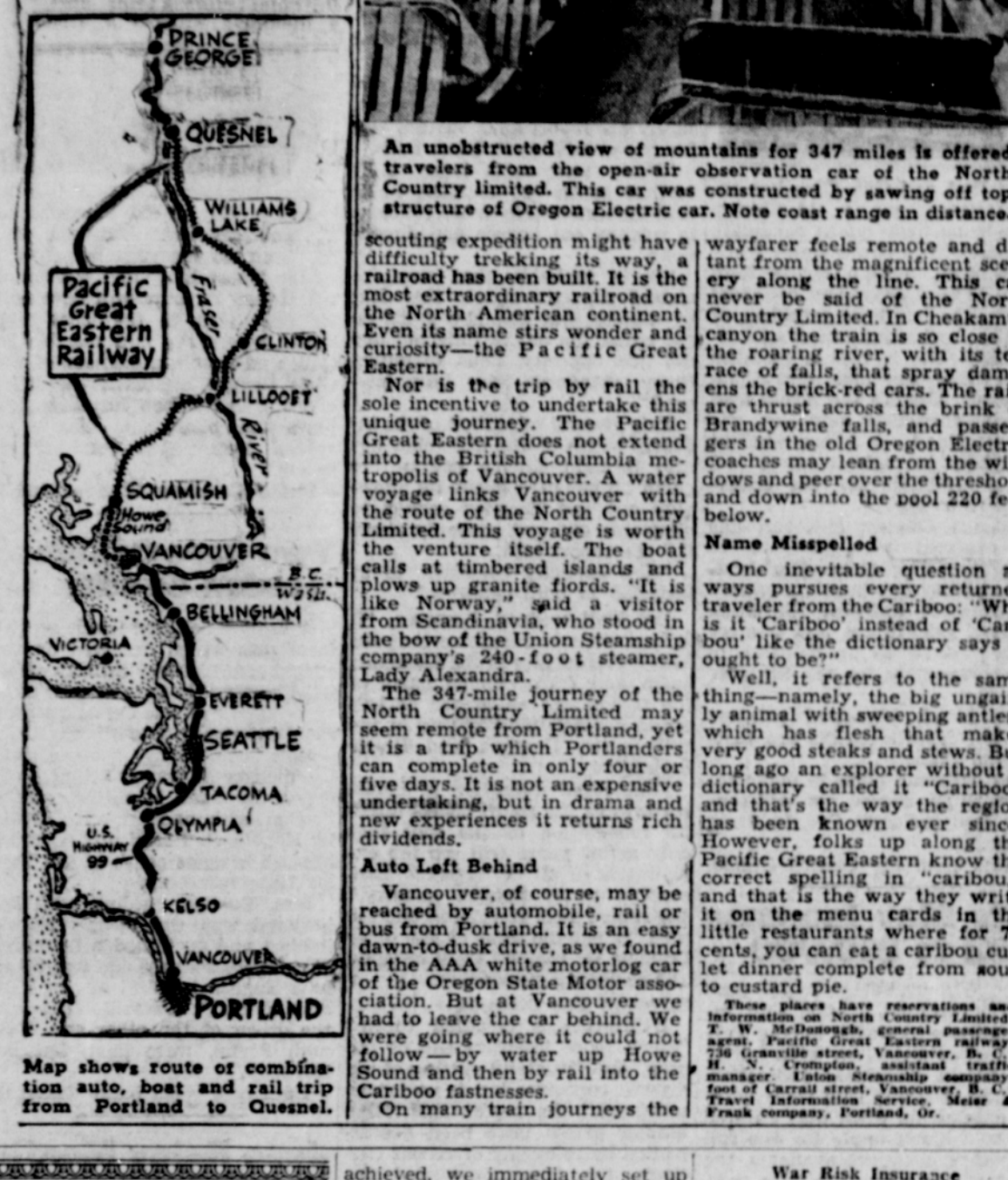
Mankind was made to strive. That is why when one goal is achieved, we immediately set up a new one more difficult to reach. This is true in every walk of life—spiritual, business or sports.
