The largest gold nugget on record was found in 1869 in a rut made by a cart, only a few inches below the surface of the ground. The nugget was known as the "Welcome Stranger."

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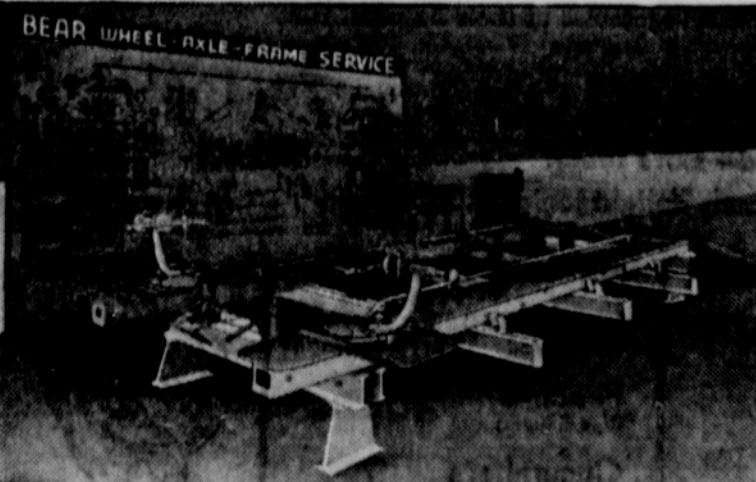

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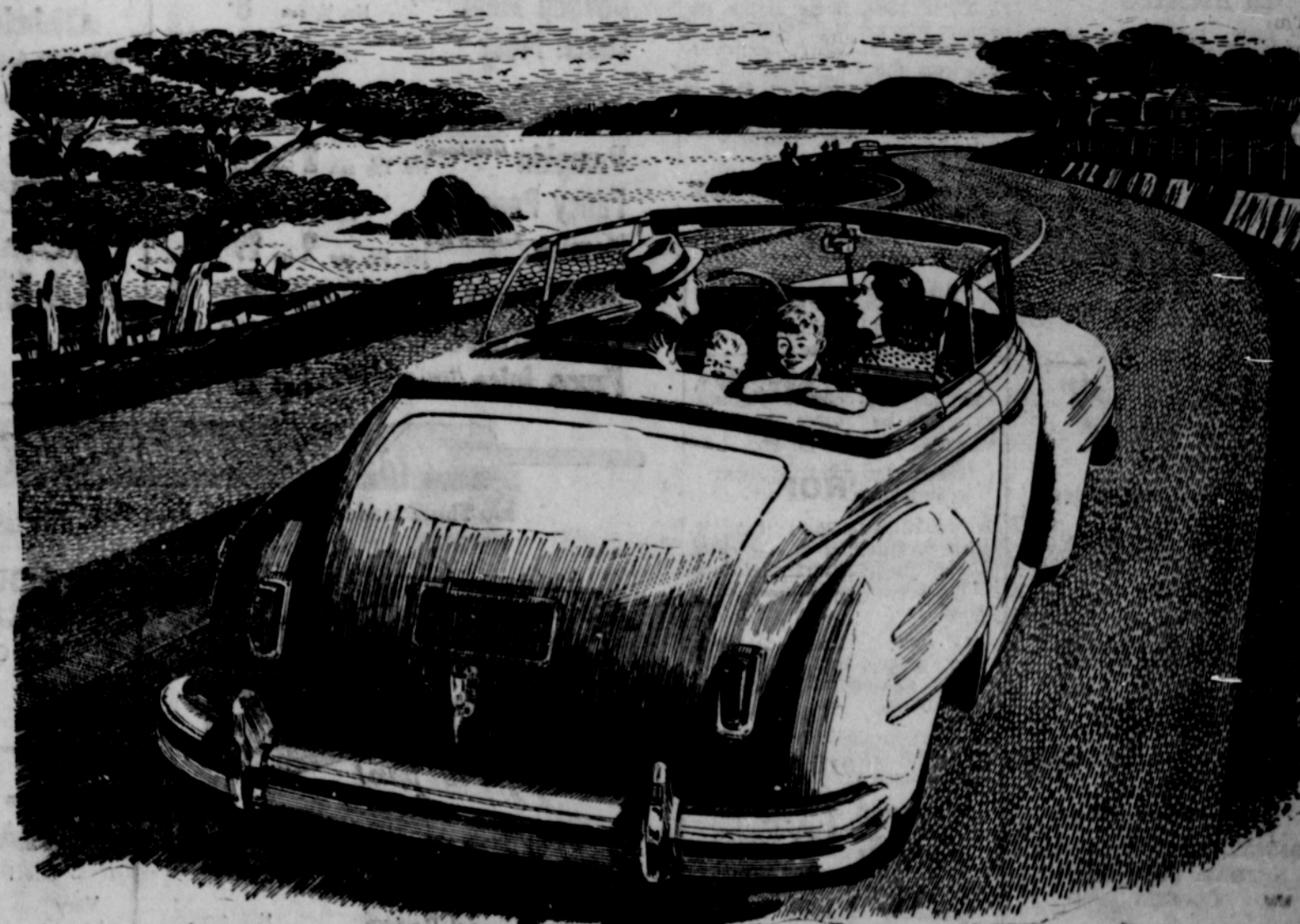
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
