Motorists Urged To Check Drivers' Licenses Schedule

No individual notice will be mailed to Oregon drivers when their licenses expire, it has been emphasized by Robert S. Farrell Jr.

"With almost 800,000 operators licensed in this state, it would be an impossible job to track down each one at just the right time to tell him he must get a new permit," he said.

A renewal schedule will tell anyone when his driver's license is no longer valid. These schedules are available free of charge at any service station, police station,

sheriff's office, or driver's license clerk or examiner.

The new renewal system, enacted by the 1947 legislature, causes licenses to expire by serial number, lowest numbers first. Those numbered 5R-1 to 5R-33,000 expired in June, and those from 5R-33,000 to 5R-66,000 must be renewed in July. Higher numbers will fall due later. The renewal schedule tells when each block of numbers expires.

A license spokesman urged drivers not to apply for new permits ahead of schedule, since "jumping the gun" would upset the service to regular applicants. In Cottage Grove, applications for renewals should be made of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. on Monday through Friday. No examination is necessary.

Those who plan to drive out-of-state before time to get a new license should carry a renewal schedule clipped to the old permit. It will serve as proof that the old license is still valid.

Mail applications are being discouraged because a high percentage of them are on the wrong form or are accompanied by an incorrect fee amount.

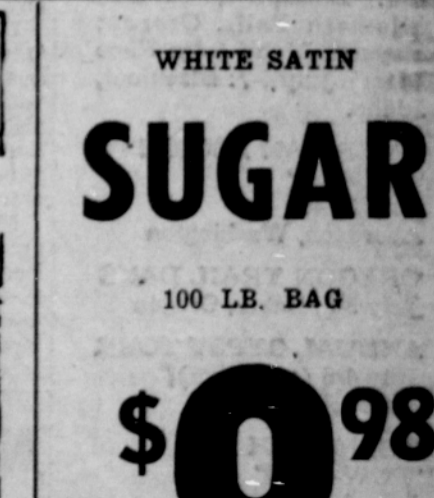
