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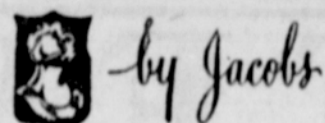

Dubach Retires Poling New Dean

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Dan W. Poling, assistant dean of men here for the past 10 years, became dean July 1, succeeding Dr. U. G. Dubach who was retired under the new state law after 34 years of service on the staff.

Dean Poling is a son of D. V. Poling, former Oregon minister and recently retired as high school visitor for the state system of higher education. He is a graduate of Oregon State College and later was for nine years principal and superintendent of schools in Maupin and Myrtle Creek.

The new assistant dean of men is Robert Fletcher, a 1947 graduate here, and son of O. S. Fletcher, county agent of Lane county. He was president of the senior class and is a returned veteran.

Discovered Synthetic Dye

For ages man has enriched his apparel and surroundings with color and for centuries he has sought new and better means of obtaining the colors he wanted. Until about 90 years ago, however, he had to depend entirely upon natural sources—trees, roots, plants and insects. It was not until 1856 that Perkin, a young English chemist, produced the first synthetic dye of commercial importance. Much has been written about this epochal discovery of Perkin's mauve, for its effects upon everyday life and science have been far-reaching. It formed the cornerstone of the dye industry we have today.

Eggs Rich in Vitamins

Eggs are important sources of most of the essential vitamins, and as with the minerals the yolk is the richer in vitamins. These vitamins include riboflavin, which is essential for health and vigor; thiamin, also called B1, which steadies nerves; niacin, which helps in preventing and curing pellagra; vitamin K, an anti-hemorrhagic factor; vitamin A for healthy body tissue and vitamin D for promoting the best use of calcium and phosphorus.

Fish Food

As to food value, for practical purposes it is common to group fish with meat, poultry and eggs. These foods are all outstanding as a source of protein, and supply iron and some B vitamins as well. Fish high in fat also contain significant amounts of vitamins A and D.

Cattle Horn-Fly Trap

Considerable success has been attained in Australia using a horn-fly trap constructed in a gateway or lane through which the cattle must pass once or twice a day. The passageway through the trap is 33 inches wide and 100 feet long.

The glass in the roof is coated on the inside with DDT and protected from the cattle by coarse screen

wire. The animal passing through the trap has to brush between and under two sets of curtains, and eight weighted strips, brush her legs and belly, dislodging the flies which rise to the light and contact the treated glass.

Anaplasmosis Gains Foothold on Range

Anaplasmosis is a febrile, infectious disease, transmitted from sick or carrier cattle or by ticks, horseflies and other biting insects. Young animals are seldom affected.

The treatment is still in the experimental stage and is largely a veterinary problem. Animals afflicted with the malady should be kept in the shade, given plenty of clean water, a little green feed, and protected against flies. Intravenous injection of mercurochrome has been used with success as well as a modified sodium-cacodylate treatment.

Remedy for Black Rot Disease Among Grapes

Use of bordeaux mixture 4-100 plus one pound of rosin fish oil soap per 100 gallons of spray mixture is recommended for those vineyards where black rot and downy mildew have been serious. This spray is applied just before bloom, just after bloom and two weeks after bloom. If rainfall is above normal, it may be necessary to make a fourth application two weeks after the third treatment.

Isolated Leprosy Bacilli

Known to man for more than 4,000 years, leprosy was virtually a scientific mystery prior to the isolation of the leprosy bacilli by the Norwegian, Dr. G. A. Hansen, in 1874.
