Lumber Orders Up Over Last Year

PORTLAND — Orders, shipments and production of Douglas fir lumber for the first six months of 1947 are substantially ahead of the first half of 1946. Harris E. Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, announced today.

Smith said shipments for the first six months of 1947 totaled 3,509,942,000 board feet, 112.5% of 1946; orders were 120% over last year at 3,565,477,000 board feet and production reached 3,481,037,000 board feet, 111.7% over last year.

"Outlook today is that the Douglas fir lumber region will pour nearly seven billion feet of lumber into the home building and construction industries this year", Smith said.

The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in June (4 weeks) was 141,312,000 board feet. Orders averaged 125,379,000 b. f.; shipments 129,322,000 b. f. Weekly averages for May were: Production 134,416,000 b. f.; orders 127,887,000; shipments 134,928,000.

Twenty-six weeks for 1947, cumulative production 3,481,037,000 b. f.; 26 weeks, 1946, 3,115,439,000; 26 weeks, 1945, 3,657,496,000.

Orders for 26 weeks of 1947 break down as follows: Rail 2,287,083,000 b. f.; domestic cargo 402,227,000; export 539,776,000; local 336,391,000.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 567,984,000 b. f. at the end of June; gross stocks at 433,450,000.

In 1844 the first telegram was sent over the wires from one city to another. The telegraph line was constructed by Samuel F. B. Morse with funds provided by Congress and amounting to \$30,000. The line went from Baltimore, Md. to Washington D. C. and in 1866 the United States and England began sending messages to each other.

Who Does Your Wiring??

ALL PERSONS, firms or corporations hereafter engaging in, conducting or carrying on the business of INSTALLING WIRES or EQUIPMENT in the State of Oregon to convey electric current or INSTALLING APPARATUS TO BE OPERATED by such current shall, for the purpose of this act, be known as electrical contractors . . . and shall . . . obtain a license therefor. (annual license fee of \$20). —Art. 2 Sec. 112-609 Laws of State of Oregon.

All journeyman electricians PERFORMING WORK of installing electric wiring or equipment to convey electric current, or installing apparatus to be operated by such current, or who as foreman supervise or direct such work . . . shall . . . make application for a license to do so, . . . and upon complying with the rules, requirements and qualifications . . . of the bureau of labor . . . and paying a license fee of \$5; a license shall be duly issued to him. — Art. 2 Sec. 112-612 Oregon Laws.

Every apprentice having less than 4 years experience in installing electric wires and equipment . . . must register with the State bureau of labor, stating . . . with whom he has been employed; and . . . bureau of labor shall issue . . . a permit to work at such trade while under the supervision of a licensed electrician. — Art. 2 Sec. 112-615 Laws of State of Oregon. (It is provided that licensing requirements do not apply to telephone, telegraph co.'s; automobile electric work, lighting of streets and alleys; the work of installing wires used by a person IN HIS OWN business or on his OWN premises; nor to power co.s. on their own lines.)

Every person, firm or corporation engaged in selling electrical equipment or supplies shall; . . . apply for registration of his place of business and . . . pay a license fee of \$1. — Art. 2 Sec. 112-617 Laws of State of Oregon.
