Mormon Tabernacle

The Mormon tabernacle is one of the major attractions in Salt Lake City. Under its great domed roof, largest of its kind in the world, it seats 8,000. It also has one of the largest unsupported arches in the world and an organ containing more than 7,000 pipes, erected in the 1860s and several times rebuilt.
